Similar deputations called upon the prefects of Lyons, Bordeaux and Mar-selles and presented their demands. In reply the prefects aid the Government was already considering many of these demands. While others had no substantial foundation. The workmen, they said, must not expect everything to be settled by Feb. 24th.
