

THE COURT HOUSE DISPUTE.

Architect Lennox and Contractor Nelson
At Their Differences.

The numerous complaints of Contractor Nelson were heard before the Property Committee of the City Council yesterday. Architect Lennox was there too, and in a tone that showed he felt himself master of the situation read clause 10 of the contract signed by the city and Mr. Nelson to show that the committee had no right to hear complaints not laid before them by himself.

The committee was called upon to give its opinion, and said that it would be un-British for him to say that the committee could not hear when they chose, but according to the terms of the contract they certainly had no power to act. He afterwards modified this by saying that it depended on the trouble complained of by the contractor. If the complaints were purely of a professional character the committee would hardly see their own opinion before the opinion of the architect. But if the architect had been guilty of betraying the city's interests they might disqualify him.

Mr. Nelson moved that Mr. Nelson be heard on the subject of the dispute. He had only paid for the \$20,000 worth of stone when the City Solicitor had said that he must do so. The stone was made and would have to go in the top of the building.

Mr. Nelson, the contractor who has the contract for the Credit Valley station, stated that he would have been able to have all the stone on the ground at the present time if he had had the dimensions required. Mr. Nelson had not furnished this and he expressed the opinion that it might end with a "friendly law suit" between him and Contractor Nelson.

The whole matter was referred to Mr. Lennox and the City Solicitor, though Mr. Nelson vigorously protested, saying that would not solve the difficulty.
