—If one wishes a dish of mashed potatoes to be appetizing, and to present an extremely elegant appearance, one must be willing to take a little extra pains with them. They should be washed through two waters, then peeled, and as fast as they are peeled thrown into a pan of cold water. They should be boiled either in a tin, or porcelain-lined vessels which should be clean as clean as you. They must be washed with boiling water, and the moment they are done lifted from the fire, and the water drained from them, fish them through a colander. To half a gallon of potatoes add a large spoonful of good, fresh butter, and a sufficient quantity of fine salt; stir the butter and salt well through them, then pour in a half teacup of sweet cream and stir in well through them, and then heat them a few minutes with a large spoon, and they'll become as white and as light as the falling snow. This should all be done very quick, so as not to allow the potatoes time to get cold. They should be sent to the table in a hot dish, and garnished with sprays of parsley.

The Dove Bird.—What a funny name for a bird! We hear our boys and girls say. And yet Humboldt in his Travels in South America, records a visit to Caripio, which is the cavern of the guinea bird. The name which the cavern bears signifies the "cave of fat," because from the young of the birds which inhabit it an immense quantity of fat is annually obtained. These birds are about the size of our common fowl, with wings which expand to three feet and a half. All day long they dwell in the cavern, and like our only come forth at night, when they subsist entirely on fruits, and have very powerful beaks, which are necessary to crack the rough nuts and seeds which form part of their food. In the summer in the harvest time they fly to the fields and enter the cavern armed with long poles; the nuts are stacked to the holes in the roof about sixty feet above their heads; they break these with the poles, and the young birds fall down and are eaten by the parent birds. Their bodies is a layer of fat, which is cut off, and is the object sought. At the mouth of the cavern nuts are eaten of palm leaves, and there, in pots of clay, the natives melt the fat which has been collected. This is known as the butter of the guinea bird; it is so pure that it may be kept for years of a year without becoming rancid. At the Convent of Caripio no other oil is ever used in the kitchen of the monks.

France's Stamp Collectors.—The mania for collecting postage stamps seems to be gaining more ground than ever in France. The country, therefore, and the perseverance of the people who amass old china and "live up to it," of the bottle-gatherers, and the hoarders of bibbles and bric-a-brac of all sorts, are almost surpassed by the collectors of miniature postage. There is a full-blown stamp exchange here, says a Paris correspondent, and among the most famous collectors in France is a man who has over 1,000,000 postage stamps and another who keeps two clerks employed in classifying and arranging his enormous collection. Additionally, the Emperor of the Russia can command, always providing that the most cured is of the best quality. It is this to 1 gallon of water take 1 lb. of salt, half lb. of sugar, half cone of saltpetre, half ounce of pearl-ash—in the ratio, the pickle is to be increased to any quantity desired. Let these be boiled together until the dirt from the salt and sugar (which will not be a little) rises to the top, and is skimmed off. Then throw it into a tub or cool, and when cold pour it over your beef or pork to remain the usual time, say four or five weeks. The meat must be well covered with pickle, and should not be put down for at least two days after killing, during which time it should be slightly sprinkled with powdered saltpetre. Several of our friends have criticized the boiling of the pickle, and found it to answer equally as well. It will not, however, answer so well. By boiling the pickle, it is purified, for the purpose of dirt which is thrown off by the operation from the salt and sugar, would surprise anyone not acquainted with the set.

No 'Colours' in the British Army.—It may be recalled that at the battle of Malakand, in Afghanistan, in which a certain infantry regiment was annihilated, but could have escaped were it not that the enemy devoted all his energies to the capture of the colours, the men stood by them in defence, and were so completely annihilated—wiped off the army list, as it were. Of course, the colours were lost. This decided the war office, and the order was issued that henceforth British soldiers must fight without colours.
