It is now the safest anchorage in the Black Sca, for the Russian fleet repose quietly at the bottom of Schastopol hurbor, and there is little chance of an irruption from Nicolsiff. There is little saelefaction in all this-and it is evid at that Russia is using every means to cause a jealousy between France and England. It would appear also that France had attempted to reduce the influence of England at Constantinople and add to her own, and that she had momentarily succeeded. The reinstatement of the Turkish ministry shows however, that the influence of Great Britain has ngain asserted its supromacy in the Turkish Councils. It is to be hoped that neither the wiles of Russia, nor the feeings of reality, will provail to disturb an all-ance upon which the peace and progress of the world so intimately depends.
