ASSISTANCE TO LOW-INCOME CANADIANS TO MEET INCREASED

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): As Madam Speaker knows, I have served notice of intention to seek an emergency debate later this day on the cruel impact this government's economic policies are having upon the lives of ordinary Canadians.

I would like to direct a question to the Minister of Finance. The minister will know that the treasurer of Ontario has suggested that some of this government's increased energy revenues should be applied next winter to a temporary national subsidy of \$75 to \$100 to help low-income Canadians pay their rising home heating costs. The minister will also know that we have had cost of living figures published today which show that fuel oil costs are up 26.9 per cent from a year ago and the cost of gas is up 20.7 per cent from a year ago.

In light of these facts, will the Minister of Finance give an undertaking to the House of Commons now that he will co-operate with provincial governments to help low-income Canadians pay their heating bills this winter, if possible?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, as the Right Hon. Leader of the Opposition has indicated, the provincial treasurer of the province of Ontario did circulate yesterday a technical working paper on the subject of home heating costs and the steps that might be taken by governments to deal with this problem. The provincial treasurer also asked that his proposal be studied and that when that study is completed I get back to him and give him my response. I replied positively to that request and at the present time I have requested my officials to examine the proposal itself and the impact of the proposal, and then we will decide what our position is, which I will convey, as I have indicated, to the treasurer of the province of Ontario.

Mr. Clark: Madam Speaker, we have a situation where, with fuel costs rocketing upwards this year, the response of the Minister of Finance of Canada is that he is going to study a technical working paper which would take effect next year. What we want to know is whether the minister and the Government of Canada are prepared to accept their responsibility, put studies aside, and do something to help ordinary Canadians who are facing expensive heating cost rises this winter.

Let me indicate to the minister that the government of Ontario, as he knows, has indicated that if Ottawa refuses to help the citizens of Ontario, Ontario will act alone. But that will not help low-income Canadians in Atlantic Canada or in Quebec. I ask the minister if he offers any hope at all to those low-income Canadians anywhere in Canada who are facing rising heating oil and fuel costs this year. Are they simply to
