articles on Operation Falcon as a result of a 10-month news investigation. These articles demonstrate that this was in fact the "Falcon Fiasco" which damaged the beautiful birds it was intended to preserve as well as many Canadians who are internationally known experts and proponents of falcon preservation.

These Canadians include the Owl Lady, Kay McKeever, recipient of the Order of Canada, and David Mossop, a leading Canadian expert on falcons, who was charged despite RCMP objections. The charges were later dropped for lack of evidence. Mossop is out of pocket thousands of dollars because of the incompetence and bungling of the Department of Justice in this area.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service had a convicted falcon smuggler on its payroll working in Canada as an undercover agent without any knowledge whatsoever of the Canadian federal Government or provincial enforcement agencies. This is illegal and is a breach of Canadian sovereignty, yet the Secretary of State for External Affairs (Mr. Clark) has lodged no formal protest whatsoever.

I call upon the Minister of Justice (Mr. Hnatyshyn) to launch a full inquiry into the falcon fiasco which would answer questions such as why the plea bargaining by federal prosecutors allowed North America's two biggest wildlife smugglers to go free, including one who claimed to have made a profit from his fines.

There must be an investigation immediately to get to the bottom of this very serious matter, to produce a full public report, and to ensure that the objectives of preserving these precious and beautiful birds were not subverted by those who would destroy Canadian sovereignty and attack Canadians who have worked for many years to save these precious birds.

SIXTY-NINTH ANNIVERSARY OF POLISH INDEPENDENCE

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S.-ELIMINATION OF RAIL CAR INSPECTIONS

Mr. Russell MacLellan (Cape Breton—The Sydneys): Mr. Speaker, Canadian National, in its latest cut-backs on the railroad on Cape Breton Island, has cut out the last railcar inspector in North Sydney.

There are no more rail car inspectors in North Sydney even though there is a great deal of traffic from North Sydney to other parts of Canada, since rail cars must go through North Sydney to pick up the containers that arrive on Atlantic Marine ferries.

There will be no rail car inspectors to inspect those cars. Instead, inspections will be carried out by brakemen. Although CN has been worried about derailments in Atlantic Canada, it will now exacerbate the situation by not inspecting these cars.

Of course the real reason for the elimination of inspectors is that it does not want cars to be repaired in Sydney, as it would mean keeping workers on the job in Sydney to do these repairs.

Now the cars will go all the way to Moncton, perhaps with cracked axles or other deficiencies, which will be a danger to the cars and, of course, to human lives.

I ask Canadian National and the federal Government to reverse this terrible decision and maintain at least one rail car inspector in the town of North Sydney.
