

## WHERE BUSINESS MEN ARE WANTED

Openings in Towns and Cities of the West Set Forth.

Containing exact information, told concisely without flourish, on openings for business men in 700 points in the Canadian west, a book now being distributed by the C. N. R., is the handiest of its kind yet issued. The handbook gives the location of the villages, towns, and cities covered, population and nationality of the people of the district, the stores, warehouses, factories, elevators and so on now located. Churches and schools are mentioned, and the name of the secretary of the board of trade, where there is one, is also given, from whom more complete information can be secured, although the handbook tells comprehensively, succinctly, all most prospective westerners would want to know. The character of the soil in the vicinity of the towns is given, the value of the land, the crops raised and the percentage of acreage under cultivation, are told. A pretty good idea of the prospects of the various sections can be obtained, as well as to lines in which new businesses are needed.

Davidson & McRae, general agents of the C. N. R., Winnipeg and Toronto, will give further information to people who are at a loss just where to locate in the west. Since the C. N. R. operated its first western section fourteen years ago, colonization efforts have been devoted almost entirely to the settling of the land along the lines of railway as fast as they were constructed. Towns grew up by themselves, but in most cases they have not kept pace with the developments of the land, and it was a desire to acquaint the tradesmen and manufacturers with the needs and opportunities in the towns along their lines that prompted the railway to publish the handbook thru its agents, Davidson & McRae.

## MORE JOLTS FOR ASQUITH CABINET

British Attorneys' Criticisms Are Mild, However, When Compared With Others.

LONDON, May 2.—(Can. Press).—At an Attorneys' Franchise League meeting tonight in Drury Lane Theatre, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt of New York, president of the International Woman Suffrage Alliance, delivered the first speech she has made since her arrival in England. Mrs. Catt said that during the three days she had been in London, which she had devoted to attending suffragette meetings, she had heard more complimentary remarks about the British Government than she had heard against the American Government during her whole life.

And Mrs. Catt heard a lot more of complaints during the course of her visit, but she said that she had not heard a single complaint against the British Government, and in addition she had heard a strong condemnation of the government for not bringing in a bill enfranchising women with enthusiasm.

"Cads and Cowards." The denouncement of the ministry by the actresses was mild, however, when compared with the abuse heaped upon it by speakers at an indignation meeting of the Women's Franchise League in Caxton Hall. A few phrases called from the speech of Miss Nina Boyle, a militant suffragette, were "Cads and Cowards," and that the ministers were "disgrace to the name of Britishers." Miss Boyle called for militant volunteers and hinted at an outbreak of militancy that had been planned "that will show this government what a pitiful opinion we have of it."
