The denouncement of the ministry by the actresses was mild, however when compared with the abuse heaped upon it by speakers at an indignation meeting of the Women's Freedom League in Caxton Hall. She said the government of the control of th ernment was composed of "cads and cowards," and that the ministers were "a disgrace to the name of Britishers." 
