JAPAN AND CHINA BOUND BY TREATIES

Signing of Documents Has Ended
Negotiations Lasting Several Months.

PEKING, May 25.—Two treaties between China and Japan, together with thirteen notes, were signed this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Chinese foreign office. This act brought to a conclusion the negotiations which have been going on since last January, when Japan, shortly after the fall of the German position of Kiaochow, presented her well-known demands to China.

GOOD REPORT FROM CAMPS

Aliens Interned Are Contented and Well Provided For, Says Sir William Otter.

General Sir William D. Otter was at the overture of the registrar of alien enemies yesterday. He stated that he had recently visited two camps on the Transcontinental line in Northern Ontario where interned Austrians are placed, a thousand in each camp. Sir William said that the men appeared to be content, are well fed, receive 25c a day for their labor, have tobacco and are supplied with warm clothing. One hundred and fifty wives are now in the camps, living with their husbands.

WILLIAM C. CURRIE DIED FROM INJURY

Well-Known Pigeon Fancier Fell
on Stairway and Fatal Results Followed.

As a result of falling on the stairway of a billiard hall at 799 Yonge street on Monday night, Wm. C. Currie, 13 Binscarth road, died yesterday in the General Hospital from head injuries. He was 57 years of age and born in Toronto. For several years he was manager of the Yonge street store of W. A. Pamphill.

He was one of the best known pigeon fanciers in Toronto and had acted as judge at the Canadian National Exhibition and a number of other shows in Canada and the United States. Mr. Currie leaves a widow and two daughters.

Lobelia Cardinalis

The Cardinal Flower.

Like Papaver Orientalis spoken of a day or two ago, and scarlet lighting talked of yesterday, the cardinal flower is one of our most startling beauties. It is a perennial, and while it cannot rival these two mentioned above in many points, yet in intensity of coloring, cardinal flower takes no second place.

You will remember that papaver orientalis sends up tall flame-cups of silken tissue, purple-hearted, whose life is but a few days; scarlet lighting sends up great round scarlet pom-poms, composed of four or five-petaled florets, whose life season stretches into many weeks; but lobelia cardinalis gives us tall four-foot spikes of blossoms crimson velvet, the buds on the lower part of the flower spike opening first, the top ones finally taking fire so that the blazing torch burns for two to three weeks.

Lobelia cardinalis is a perennial that can be most easily obtained by planting seed this year, and transplanting the seedlings early next spring, or perhaps later in September. These plants, if allowed to form clumps, will in a year or two form one of the most striking ornaments in your garden. But do not plant lobelia cardinalis near either papaver orientalis or scarlet lighting. The colors will clash. Do not, however, allow your clumps to get too thick, else like the iris the blossoms will deteriorate in size, number and coloring.

Propagation by root-division as well as by transplanting of seedlings can be easily managed.

I might mention to our wildflower lovers that lobelia cardinalis is one of our native northern wildflowers. Often found in bogs, lowlands or even swamps, its range extends from the Gulf states into New Brunswick, and July until September. This cardinal flower brightens up the woods, and specimens can be brought in from the wild with care and acclimated to the garden. In nearly every case the little tramps like the change, as is evidenced by the fact that they flourish in most amazing manner in their new homes.

Just try the scheme and see for yourself, gardeners.

The specimen sent me is a good old-fashioned "forget-me-not." Did you not know forget-me-not by the society you just keep right on with your gardening, boys or no boys. What on young things? Now the boys never, never touch my things. Why? Well, just because they know that I have not the least doubt at all in the matter. These blossoms they are as welcome to as I can make them. A little blossom goes a long way with boys—much longer than with girls. Just you try them, Aurelia, and you will see.

Boys will be just exactly what you expect them to be generally speaking. If you expect them to destroy your garden they will do so. I fear. At least that is the only way I can reason the matter out.

REVISING BYLAWS.
