BRANCH LINES OF G.T.P. CARVELL AMENDMENT GOES

New Brunswick Member Ridicules Position of Emmerson That Moral Obligation Binds.

Ottawa, June 25.—(Special).—There was the usual debate in committee this afternoon between the New Brunswick members concerning the branch lines to be built by the Grand Trunk Pacific from Moncton to the sea. The matter came up on an amendment offered by Mr. Carvell (Carleton, N.B.) to the pending bill to incorporate the Grand Trunk Pacific Branch Lines Company. He insisted upon a branch being built to St. John, N.B., and ridiculed the position taken by Mr. Emmerson, that the moral obligation resting upon the G.T.P. to build to St. John was sufficient without any legal sanction.

Dr. Daniel (St. John) also favored the amendment. Also opposed by the ministers present, the amendment carried—yeas 44, nays 20.

The Mackintosh divorce case was up again. Some days ago the private bills committee reported against the bill, but it was referred again to that committee for further consideration. Subsequently the committee recommended the divorce, and the matter came up in the house to-day upon the regular order. Mr. Gairdner (Kootenay) opposed the bill. It should have been referred back to the select committee. It had been rejected by a vote of 18 to 12, but when the committee recommended the divorce, the matter was brought forward. These officers were elected by acclamation by the board of trade this evening: Frank H. Close, president; R. A. Robertson, vice-president; Chas. Stiff, secretary.

TURN DOWN FOR HAMILTON.

The Toronto and Hamilton Railway Co. and the Toronto and Niagara Power Co., interests controlled by the same capitalists, must pay the Ontario government \$500 yearly rental for the 90-foot right-of-way over Burlington Beach, jointly used for tracks and power transmission lines. A lease so providing has been signed and will settle a contention arising out of an attempt by the Hamilton City Council to secure \$1000 from the companies for a right-of-way, the city having had a lease of Burlington Beach from the government for nearly 35 years. The government will probably expend the rental fee in improving the beach.

ILLITERATE POLICE.

Ten of New York's "Finest" Let Go and More May Follow.

New York, June 25.—In explaining the revocation of the appointments of ten special policemen, Police Commissioner Bingham to-day said that his action was the beginning of a wholesale investigation which he will make into the character and fitness of the 1700 special policemen now on duty in this city.

He said that a large number of these special officers are illiterate. The commissioner mentioned one case, in which the officer in question could neither read nor speak English.

KILLED IN DOORWAY.

Miner Struck by Lightning and Orange Hall Wrecked.

Amherst, N.S., June 25.—(Special).—A severe electrical storm passed over Amherst last evening, causing one death and destroying several buildings at Springhill.

The Orange Hall on the Herriot-road was struck by lightning, causing one death and destroying several buildings at Springhill.

Stack, miner, who was standing in the doorway for shelter, was instantly killed, and John Fraser, who was standing beside him, was stunned by the shock, but not seriously hurt. The building was wrecked, but did not catch fire.

MINISTER MUST RETRACT ALDERMAN WIELDS STICK

Hamilton Deputation to See Government and Lay Claim to Beach.

Hamilton, June 25.—(Special).—At this evening's session of the city council Ald. Witton defended himself and colleagues against insinuations made in a letter published under the signature of Rev. J. J. Morton, that the aldermen were being bribed to support the parks route. The alderman characterized the minister's conduct as scurrilous and said that he would not stop until Mr. Morton had made the apology.

The council appointed E. B. Wingate to choose a route for the Hamilton, Waterloo and Guelph Railway, but stipulated that the cost should not exceed \$500.

The draft proclamation containing the terms on which the beach residents are willing to cash in their lot with the city was approved and a large deputation was named to wait upon the Ontario government to present the city's claim to the beach.

The bylaw providing for changes in street names was given two readings, but was held over until the next meeting of the council when it is probable small alterations to the committee's report will be made. The new license bylaw was carried. T. H. Pratt was reappointed as a governor of the city hospital.

Dies of Lockjaw.

Fred Crowther, 34 East Main-street, the traveler who was seized by lockjaw two weeks after undergoing an operation for appendicitis, died this evening. He was 35 years of age and leaves a widow.

ALDERMEN WHO ARE CHOSEN FOR NEW HOSPITAL BOARD

Sharp Contest at Yesterday's Council Meeting With the Adoption of a Slate of Five.

The city's representatives to the new hospital board, elected by the council at 7 o'clock last night after the mayor, Ald. Dunn, Noble, McGhie and Controller Jones. It was Ald. Church who moved that the choices be made, just as the aldermen were about to adjourn after a lengthy session.

A letter was read from Mr. Flaville under date of June 12, stating that the beneficiaries of the Toronto General Hospital were meeting to select trustees to represent them on the board of that institution, and asking the mayor to indicate whether it is the purpose of the members of council to select some of the five members to be named by them from prominent citizens outside the council.

"I venture on behalf of the present board to ask the question as we recognize that in the selection made by the various bodies it is desirable that the completed board be, thoroly representative in character," wrote Mr. Flaville.

The suggestion of outsiders did not appeal to the aldermen as a particularly inviting one. No outside citizen, outside the council, was named by them from prominent citizens outside the council.
