ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT IS TO BE REORGANIZED

HAMILTON, Aug. 7.—(Special).—The fire and water committee this evening decided to ask the council to appoint a committee to consider the reorganization of the city engineer's department. Ald. Farrar made the move. He found fault because after spending about \$10,000 on a meter for the Westinghouse Company, three years ago, Mr. Barrow had neglected to have it installed. He said that transaction alone stamped him as being unfit for his position. He also charged that for the last five years Mr. Barrow had made a succession of mistakes, such as the mountain drain and the reservoir. He was prepared to discuss Mr. Barrow's dismissal, resignation or the reorganization of the department. Chairman Clark, while not defending Mr. Barrow, declared that Mr. Barrow would not have been in the position now if he had not yielded to aldermanic influence, and he declared that Mr. Barrow had been treated with consideration by aldermen if he installed the Westinghouse meter. The other members of the committee considered Mr. Barrow a capable engineer, but weak-kneed, and they also thought he had too much to do, so it was agreed to ask the council to reorganize the department. The committee will deal with the question of installing new pumps at the next meeting of the committee. A bill for \$375 for services of the dredge used in connection with the sand sucker was passed. W. McDougall was appointed to the fire department.

Hamilton Happenings

WILL COST \$121,000 FOR LIGHTING PLANT

Figures Supplied City of Hamilton by Engineer of Hydro-Electric Company.

HAMILTON, Aug. 8.—To install a municipal lighting plant when the Cataract Power Company's contract for supplying the city with lamps expires in July, 1909, would cost over \$121,000 according to an estimate supplied by T. W. Sothmen, chief engineer of the Hydro-Electric Commission.

The Cataract Company has quoted \$60 a lamp for a ten-year contract and \$65 for five years for 500 arc lamps. W. A. Logie of Chisholm & Logie, on behalf of an unknown company, offered to supply 500 arc lamps at \$65 for ten years and \$60 for five years. The present price average about \$42.50.

The American Street Lamp Company offered to supply 500 gas lamps, including everything, at \$31 for five years and \$30 for ten years. The Hamilton Gas Light Company's price was \$31.50 for five years and \$28.50 for ten years.

The aldermen decided that it would require a special meeting to go through into the tenders and the estimate supplied by the Hydro-Electric Commission. The expenditure indicated above includes that for over 45 miles of pole line construction, which would be available for power and lighting distribution. If one-half of this pole construction were charged to power and lighting service the cost of arc lighting would be reduced by \$4.75 per year per lamp, the cost of power for arc lighting would also be reduced, owing to the fact that the capacity required for street lighting could be utilized by motor engines.

The equipment suggested is believed to be the best that could possibly be procured and is calculated to give the cheapest service consistent with high efficiency and reliability. The lamps are long burning, luminous arcs, giving an effective illumination at least one-third greater than the present 480 Watt A.C. lamp.

The synchronous motors in the estimate have such over capacity as will enable them to effect an annual saving on power supplied to induction motor users of over \$1200 per year. This would result in a further reduction in the cost of street lights of \$2.40 per lamp.

Capital cost of poles, wire, lamps, etc., \$98.50 per lamp, on which the fixed charges are \$10.25 per annum. The operating charges are Power, \$3.75; renewals, \$6; making a total cost of \$30.01 per lamp per year. It can be stated that the cost of this arc lighting will be reduced by \$2 per lamp or more, if the annual cost of pole construction were shared by a lighting and power engineer.

If the renewal charges on the new high efficiency incandescent lamps could be reduced, they would be desirable for residential street lighting. It should be stated in connection with the above estimate that circuits of these lamps could be operated on the above cost only when such street lighting service shares in the cost of larger transformers installed for incandescent lighting service.

It is intended that these circuits shall be operated by switches controlled by the series of street lights. The number of arc lamps estimated on were replaced partially by Nernst lamps of the Hamilton Patent type, multiple circuits the cost of the arc lighting per lamp might be slightly increased.

FINES PAINLESS DENTIST. Magistrate Jeffs Gives Important Decision in Hamilton.

HAMILTON, Aug. 7.—Magistrate Jeffs this morning gave his judgment in the case of James Henry, proprietor of the Hamilton Patent Cigarette Parlor, fined him \$20 and costs, with the alternative of one month in jail.

His worship remarked that unless there was an appeal, his decision practically meant that the painless dental parlors must close. The defendant was tried a week ago on a charge laid by the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario of practicing dentistry and giving treatment to a dental doctor, while not a member of the college. After reviewing the arguments in the case, Magistrate Jeffs noted that "if a person can be said to be practicing the profession of dentistry without being himself actually engaged in dental operation—and I find that he can—the defendant is guilty of violation of section 28, C. 17, R.S.O. 1897. I so find. This finding is made easier from the fact that the persons who actually perform dental operations are but salaried servants of the defendant, and therefore can be said to be practicing only in the profession assumed by their principal."

There will be an appeal from the magistrate's decision. Two qualified dentists are employed in the dental parlors, the defendant being merely the proprietor. Muskoka. LONDON, Aug. 7.—After a long and uninteresting debate, in which the leaders of the opposition indicated their intention of amending the measure in committee, the ejected Irish tenants' bill passed its second reading in the house of lords.

A dramatic incident of the debate followed the appearance of Lord Clanricarde, the most hated landlord in Ireland. With bent and shrunken frame, outstretched shrivelled fingers and in a voice now shrill, now husky with passion, he denounced the bill in unflattering terms as the "apotheosis of robbery."

Every member of the house turned to watch the speaker, but his speech was received in chilly silence.
