THE MANITOBA FLAG WAS HOISTED.
Under the Influence of the Mounted Police It Was Hauled Down.
Much Ill-Feeling Expressed by the Incident, Which Took Place in the Yukon District—Gold Royalty to Be Maintained—Canadian Steamers Banned in Trouble With the E. S. Customs—Ottawa News.

Ontario, Jan. 14.—(Special).—The importance of prompt measures being taken to secure the speedy settlement of the Canadian-Alaskan boundary dispute is emphasized by an incident reported to the Government to-day by Collector Milne of Victoria. This officer, one of the most capable men in the customs service, wires that he has just received a letter from Skagway stating that the United States flag was hoisted in front of the Customs House at that point, and the flag was hauled down. The incident has given rise to much ill-feeling.

INSPECTOR STRICKLAND, who has just reached Victoria, says the Mounted Police there is no starvation at present, but that when spring comes there will be a shortage of food. Inspector Strickland is going to Prince Rupert to bring Mrs. Strickland along with him to Tagish, where he is to be stationed.
