The holiday rush at the Union Station commenced yesterday, altrough the reduced rates do not go into effect until this morning. The depot was througed from early morn until late at night, with a surging mass of humanity, some going out of the city to spend the holidays, and others coming into the city. The rush from the Northwest was so heavy that it was necessary to run a special train, which arrived here about 9.30 o'clock last night. The regular train was delayed about an hour, owing to the big traffic. Nearly all the passengers from the west were farm laborers, who were returning home for the festal season. Both the C.P.R. and the Grand Trunk trains from Hamilton were late, while the G.T.R. express from the east was over three hours behind time. "Bob" Harrison says that the traffic of yesterday was away ahead of the travel on any of the excursion days last Christmas. An interesting Judgment.

An interesting judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada may be quoted in connection with the recent accident.

Chief Justice Taschereau, in giving the judgment of the court in May, 1895, in the case of the Toronto Rairway Company, appellants, and Edward Gosnell, respondent, said: "The appellants would contend that they are not bound by any particular rate of speed, that they can go as fast as they please, that persons entering upon, crossing, or otherwise using portions of any roadway covered by the tracks, do so at their own peril, caveat viator. These astounding propositions, it is not surprising, have not found the assent of a single judge out of the eight who had to pass on the case in the courts below, and it is not complimentary to this court that the appelants must be assumed to have believed that we might here countenance their contentions. They were wrong, however, and they will have to abandon such unreasonable claims, and act accordingly in the future. There was ample evidence for the jury that the cars were going at an unreasonable rate of speed. These street railway companies must remember that they have not the exclusive right of way and that the private traveler in the streets of the city is justified in assuming that the cars will be kept under control and driven moderately and prudently."

City's Insurance Rate Goes Up.

The sub-Committee on Property having on mand the insurance on city property met again yesterday afternoon privately in the office of the City Treasurer.

Chairman Dunn explained to The World that some features of the business on hand could not be discussed before the newspaper representatives without the possibility of injury to the public interest.

There were present at the meeting: Ald, Burns, Lamb and Sheppard, as well as the Treasurer and Secretary McQuaig, for the underwriters.

The result of the meeting was in the nature of a surprise. The rate was advanced from \$1.75 to \$1.87½ for the three years' period, but the insurance was renewed only for a term of three months. The total amount of city property thus insured is \$1.400,000, \$700,000 of which is upon the new buildings, and \$700,000 on the property outside the buildings, including fire halls, etc.

The committee will meet next week to reconsider the question in its larger aspect of renewing on the new rate, or, as an alternative, drawing up a scheme of the city insuring its own property. The new rate is equivalent to 16 cents for \$100 for the three months' term, pro rafa.


