FOR THE BORDEN AMENDMENT, 59; AGAINST IT, 40 FITZPATRICK LEADS—VOTE COMES AT MIDNIGHT

This is the Way the Members Toe the Line

Thirteen Opposition Members Support the Government on Division—Minister of Justice, in Two-Hour Speech, Admits Pride in Fathering Clause 16—Differences With Sifton Those as Between Two Strong-Minded Men.

Ottawa, May 3.—(Special.)—The closing of the second act in the great western drama was played to day and to night before an audience that listened attentively to the words of the principals on the floor below. With the exception of members who are detained at home thru illness there were no absentees. The energetic work of the whip had the desired effect. Every galliard of Footenay shook off the allurement of New York to be present at the division, and Clifford Sifton occupied his rarely filled seat on the front government benches. Frank Oliver, smiling, but still a trifle ill at ease in the glare of the lime light, was next to Charles Hyman. Sir Wilfrid and the other ministers were there. Sir William Mulock, respondent in a new suit and with the air of a man who was not quite sure he was about to cast his vote in the way his Ontario constituents wished him to do, was in his accustomed seat. Nearly every member of the opposition was in the house, Mr. Foster appearing late in the evening. The chief event of the afternoon session was the effort of Mr. Fitzpatrick. When he had finished the whole of the government members crowded round and the minister of justice held a hand-shaking bee. Mr. Fitzpatrick had one or two tilts with Mr. Borden in the nature of legal technicalities. His speech spread over the whole of the afternoon session.

HON. JAMES SUTHERLAND AFTER A YEAR'S ILLNESS IS DEAD AT WOODSTOCK

Notable Career in Business, Municipal Affairs and Politics—Genius for Work and His Sound Judgment Secret of Genuine Success.

Woodstock, May 3.—(Special.)—Profound regret is evidenced thruout the entire city over the death of James Sutherland, representative of the north riding of Oxford in the house of commons for the past twenty-four years and minister of justice in the late Laurier cabinet. The end came at 5 o'clock this afternoon, after an illness extending over one year. Since his return from Texas a month ago all hopes of his recovery had been abandoned. The funeral takes place Saturday afternoon from his late residence, Adelaide, to the Presbyterian cemetery. Public men from all over Canada will be present.

PREMIER SOBBS AS HE TELLS HOUSE OF MINISTER'S DEATH

Pathetic Tribute From Sir Wilfrid Laurier to Friend and Colleague—Mr. Borden Re-Echoes Sentiments—Condolence From the Senate.

Ottawa, May 3.—(Special.)—The news of the death of Hon. James Sutherland reached the house just as the members were flocking in for the afternoon session, and spread like wildfire. The whips of each side had been working like beavers to get their followers here for the division, to take place in the next few hours. If precedent were followed an adjournment of the house would be made, out of respect to the deceased minister. Under existing conditions such a course was almost impossible as, if adjournment were made until the funeral was over, great difficulty would be met with in getting the rank and file once more into line. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the chamberlain and Bourassa voted against the amendment being reversed.

POLITICAL EFFECT IS DELICATE MEANS VERY TORRID BY-ELECTION

Hon. Chas. Hyman Must Now of Necessity Test Public Opinion in London—Prospect Not Inviting.

The political situation arising from the death of Mr. Sutherland is a delicate one from the government's standpoint. The portfolio of public works will go of course to Charles Hyman. In the last general election Mr. Sutherland had been acting minister of that department for a year and a half. Mr. Hyman will then have to go back to London for reelection in the view of autonomy legislation, upon which the issue must be fought out, the London fight will be one of the hottest ever engaged in in the Dominion.

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When the prime minister closed, the leader of the opposition arose and said: "I rise, Mr. Speaker, for the purpose of supporting the motion the prime minister has made. The emotion which the right hon. gentleman has displayed has indicated to the house more eloquently than even eloquent words could have done, the very great loss we feel he has sustained on this occasion.
