ed on top of the wagon until it re-
ached the foot of the hill, and in
attempting to make a turn around the
corner, the team upset the wagon,
and Mr. McIntosh was pinned un-
derneath the heavy load of apple bar-
rels. He was picked up in an un-
conscious condition, and kind hands
carried him to the Franklin House,
near by, and summoned medical as-
sistance. Dr. Mothersill did all in
his power to relieve the sufferings of
the unfortunate man. It is stated
that the life of Mr. McIntosh is de-
spaired of at present.

A NEW TEACHER
Added to the High School Staff—A Fifth
Form in the Public Schools
Suggested.

A special meeting of the Board of
Education was held last night for the
purpose of deciding the appointment
of an extra teacher for the lower
forms in the Collegiate Institute. The
over-crowding of the school necessi-
tates an addition to the staff. It was
reported that Miss Kelson, of Ingersoll,
who was recommended at the last
meeting of the board, would be willing
to come at a salary of \$300 per year.
The board decided to engage her.

In speaking of the appointment,
Trustee Hunt referred to the over-
crowding of the school, and said that
something should be done to lessen
the attendance, or in a short time an
addition to the building would be
necessary. He suggested the estab-
lishment of a fifth form in the public
schools. This, he said, could be done
without extra expense, as the classes
could be taught by the principals of
the schools along with their other
work.

Sewerage Systems.

**Mr. Chipman Asked to Report on
Ottawa's Proposed Works.**

**Pointed References to the Experiences
in This City.**

Mr. Chipman, the engineer who was
consulted by the London authorities
with regard to the proposed sewerage
system, was asked by the Ottawa
Journal to inspect and report on a
proposed system of sewerage for Ot-
tawa, which will be voted on on Nov.
3. The Ottawa people are asked to
have the system known as the "combin-
ed" system, to carry off storm water,
as well as sewage and drainage. Mr.
Chipman says he cannot examine and
report on the Ottawa plans and sys-
tem in the short time given—before
Oct. 15. He thus refers to the separate
system, which does not carry off
storm water, and which has been
adopted in this city.

"In 1892 I made a report for the
city of London upon a proposed
sewer system and method of
sewage disposal, which report was
not acted upon at the time; but last
year two expert engineers (one from
Boston) were engaged to report upon
this city. The report was received,
consideration to the reports received,
my scheme has been adopted and a
law has been passed to construct
the works. If, at the first,
engineers had been engaged to report
upon the combined system, or who
were ignorant of the practical
work of the city, the result would
have been postponed indefinitely.

"The first town in Canada to adopt
the separate system was Brockville,
where it was introduced upon my
recommendation, after consultation
with Col. Waring, the father of the
separate system in America, and En-
gineer Pierson, of Michigan, who
has had great experience in the con-
struction of separate systems.

"Mr. Chipman maintains that, as the
sewers in the separate system are
smaller than in the combined system,
the cost is much less, consequently a
larger area can be sewered and a
greater population served with the
same amount of money.

"The larger cities in Canada know
practically nothing of separate
system. I am convinced that if it
were thoroughly understood by the
aldermen and the city officials that
it would be generally adopted in the
residential portions.
