Mr. Chipman Asked to Report on Ottawa's Proposed Works.

Sewerage Systems.

Pointed References to the Experience in This City.

Mr. Chipman, the engineer who was consulted by the London authorities with regard to the proposed sewerage system, was asked by the Ottawa Journal to inspect and report on a proposed system of sewerage for Ottawa, which will be voted on on Nov. 3. The Ottawa people are asked to adopt what is known as the "combined" system, to carry off storm water, as well as sewage and drainage. Mr. Chipman says he cannot examine and report on the Ottawa plans and system in the short time given-before Oct. 15. He thus refers to the separate system, which does not carry off storm water, and which has been
