BINDER TWINE FOR SALE.

The lot consists, approximately, of five hundred tons of "Pure Manilla," "Mixed" and "Pure Sisal" twine, and includes the twine on hand and manufactured since the 1st of August last, as well as that which may be manufactured before the 1st of August next. The twine will be delivered to a. b. cars Kingston in quantities to suit the purchaser. The Penitentiary warehouse to be cleared of all twine on the 1st of August next, at which date the contract will terminate.

STILL ANOTHER WAR CLOUD

Serious Trouble With the Af- ghans Probable.

All the English Leave Cabul—Grave Crisis Confronts Curzon.

London, Feb. 18.—Lord Curzon is threatened at the very outset of his career as viceroy of India by another war with Afghanistan, involving, in all likelihood, a conflict with Russia. The extreme gravity of the situation in Afghanistan will be realized when it is stated that Sir Salter Pyne, who for many years has been the principal European adviser of the ameer, the chief of all the Europeans in Afghan Government employ, and repeatedly the ameer's envoy to Calcutta and to London, has announced that he will not return to Afghanistan. He was on his way to Cabul, and had reached Peshawar, the British headquarters on the Afghan frontier, when news reached him from Cabul which caused him to wait there until he could obtain further information from the Afghan capital.

This information has now reached him, and in consequence thereof he is on his way back to Calcutta.

ENGLISH LEAVE CABUL.

It is a significant fact that at the present moment not a single English person remains at Cabul, even the lady physician long connected with the ameer's zenana having quitted Cabul within the last few weeks.
