The Discovery of Big New Ships Amazes-Best War Craft Ever on Ways.

London, Oct. 15.-Unbounded amaze ment has been created by revelation regarding the secret building of three huge, swift battleships for the British navy. It has been so unusual hitherto for the naval authorities of Great Britain to keep anything up their sleeve that their new policy of reticence is regarded with surprise

It may be remembered that a storm of indignation was created throughout the country at a suggestion of building only one of the new proposed Dreadnaughts. Consequently the sensation was intense when it transpired that three mysterious armored cruisers approaching completion on the Cylde and at Elsick, which are too far advanced to preserve the secret any longer, are not cruisers at all, but battleships-every bit as powerful as those of the Dreadnaught type and a great deal faster.
