Toronto Leafs Split Twin Bill With Buffalo--Entries Made For Boxing Bouts

OVER FIFTY SOLDIERS TO BOX AT ARMORIES SATURDAY NIGHT

More Than Twenty-Five Bouts Will Be Staged—Special Battle Between Sergts. Palmer and Dyer—St. Thomas Soldiers Enter.

More than fifty soldiers from the local garrison and St. Thomas units will participate in the boxing bouts to be staged in the armories here on Saturday night. Arrangements for a bout between Sergts. Palmer and Dyer, ex-Canadian and Australian champions respectively, have been made, and will provide the feature of the evening.

There will be over 25 matches in all. A special six-round battle will be staged between St. Thomas and Toronto pugilists. The program will be represented by the two provincial pugilists previously referred to.

It was the intention of local boxing promoters to arrange for a battle with Jack Ford, the big, heavy pugilist, who has been called away to Windsor, however, and it is unlikely that he will make his appearance in time for the games on Saturday.

Every class in the pugilistic world will be represented. Two bands will be in attendance. Tickets are selling at a fast rate and a large crowd is expected.

In future there will be boxing bouts staged every Wednesday afternoon, either at the armories or Tecumseh hall, and will mark an epoch in local military boxing history.

Keen rivalry has already been evidenced between the St. Thomas and London soldiers in connection with the boxing bouts. The Railway City champions are out to win the prizes for the boxing bouts. The local boys are equally determined that all trophies will become the property of Londoners.
