"NOT AN END, BUT A MEANS."

It is a prominent man of the city, a member of one of the civic boards, by the way, who writes as follows this week to the Consumers' League Department:

London, Jan. 8, 1918.

Dear Miss Armstrong,—I am very much interested in the child welfare exhibit to be held in the city the beginning of February. Think it is a splendid thing, and a fine way to start out the new year. I am so interested, in fact, that I have started investigating the subject of child welfare, and finding out what is being done in other places. It seems to me London is very much behind the times, and that it is high time we were wakening up to the serious responsibility not only of saving the lives of babies, so many of whom die unnecessarily, but also of building up a robust citizenship. I like particularly the idea of the baby clinics and the giving of record cards to the parents, showing exactly how the babies measure up to standard efficiency for youngsters at their ages. I would like to see this carried still farther. I am sure the giving of prizes and blue ribbons to the babies who conform nearest to the standards of perfection will stimulate much interest. But this should not be allowed to die away afterwards, or where is any lasting benefit of the baby welfare week and exhibit? I would suggest that clinics be held again in six months, say at Victoria Hospitai or the Institute of Public Health, and that blue ribbons be then given to the babies who show the greatest progress in that time. Progress and development would be arrived at by comparing in each case the first score card with the second. Of course, only the babies presented at both clinics would be second. Of course, only the babies presented at both clinics would be eligible for the second blue ribbon contest.

"What I really am hoping is that London will show its wisdom by having one (or more) permanent baby clinic established long before

" About 250 babies out of every 1,000 die before birth or in their first year.' 'Since so many men of the country are under arms, and many thousands are killed every year while the war lasts, the birth-rate must drop. It is, therefore, more important than ever to preserve the lives of the children who are born. Never was this so difficult. A large proportion of mothers, who in ordinary times would not be employed in any trade, but would be at home looking after their children. any trade, but would be at home looking after their children, are now absent, for many hours a day, doing war work, which in itself, from its strenuous nature, has a prejudicial effect upon births.'

IMPORTANT NATIONAL SERVICE.

"The last part of this quotation refers more to conditions in the old country than in Canada, and our own city, but at the same time it seems to me that we can scarcely render a more important service to the nation and empire at this time than putting forth every effort to save

"I trust the child welfare exhibit will meet with great success, and be instrumental in awakening a real, lasting, practical interest in child welfare work, not only in this city, but throughout Western Ontario. "I think that is another fine idea about a Western Ontario day. I hope the committee will succeed in making some arrangements about convention or excursion rates on the railroads, which will make it pos-
