CITY BREVIES

CAMPAIGN COMING.—The Y. M. C. A. will launch a financial campaign in the city on October 3 and 4. It applied to the board of control today for permission to erect banners on the Richmond and Dundas streets. The request was granted.

A BIG SOLDIER'S CHORUS.—A. D. Jordan, organist of the First Methodist Church, will put forth every effort this coming winter to have a combined chorus of all the soldiers of Carling Heights. Plans for this are now under consideration. Good singing is expected from the men.

SENTENCED SATURDAY.—Walter E. Taylor, who was charged with stealing a camera from the building on Bathurst street formerly occupied by the M. C. R. at a station, but more recently used as a fruit warehouse, appeared before Judge J. C. Judd this morning. Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop prosecuted and W. R. Meredith was the counsel for the defence. The evidence was all taken and judgment was reserved until Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE.—As a result of the story which appeared in the Advertiser the other day, making an appeal for girls and women to help with canning in a factory which has a large Government order, and which sends the greater part of its output to the Y. M. C. A. canteens in France, we have already received letters from eight or ten applicants. That story was great, and the appeal made in a way to go right home. The foregoing is what the local Women's Government Employment Bureau told the Advertiser today.

TWO PLEAD GUILTY TO THEFT OF SUGAR

Frank Durance and Arthur Heason, who were charged with the theft of some sugar from John Garvey & Sons' warehouse, elected summary trial and pleaded guilty. Sentence was deferred until September 23.

Alexander Mann, fruit dealer, Dundas street, sold a basket of grapes to a youth at a reduction, and, according to the evidence, swore at him for taking it. The purchaser returned the basket and asked for his money back. The youth was refused, and Mann was accordingly haled before the magistrate. Two witnesses substantiating the plaintiff's evidence, Mann was ordered to return the 45 cents to the purchaser and pay the costs of the court, despite the fact that he denied the charges.

One man charged with having no useful occupation did not appear, and a warrant will be issued for him. Another case of a similar nature was adjourned sine die, as the accused had gone to work. A third case was adjourned for one month. Three breaches of the traffic bylaws were punished by nominal fines.

WOOD SELLING FAST

Brisk Demand on Utilities Commission in Last Few Days.

The cool atmosphere which has prevailed the past few days, especially at nights, has proven a boon to business for the municipal wood yard conducted by the utilities commission.

Manager Buchanan stated today that the wood is going out fast now in third cord loads, which is being sold at \$4.75 a load. About ten loads were sold Thursday.

The commission has between 700 and 800 cords of wood on hand to help out the fuel situation.

GENERAL STRIKE IN COAL MINE REGION OF WEST THREATENED

9,000 Men Will Be Involved if a Break Should Develop.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 19.—Unless the demands of the miners in the Fernie district for a shift of eight hours be granted, or the operators' consent to meet the men and discuss their request, a general strike involving 9,000 men, and including the coal mining sections of all the eastern British Columbia and part of Alberta, will be declared, representatives of the miners now in Vancouver stated today.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 19.—Philadelphia was selected as the meeting place for next year at the closing session of the supreme council of the Scottish Rite for the northern Masonic jurisdiction here today. HUNDREDS OF GIRLS WILL GATHER MITES TO BUILD ARMY HUTS

Tag Day For K. of C. Work in England and France Should Bring Inspiring Response From Citizens—An Appeal To Help a Soldier's Cause.

Tag days come and tag days go, but the cause lives on. Fought by the best of the country's manhood, backed by the money of the nation's masses, it must be pushed to an end, and the only end that can satisfy, in avenging those who have fallen, those who remain.

Appeals for patriotic purposes have come at short intervals during the last four years, but never one that has not had a most worthy object—for the protection of soldiers' and sailors' families, for the salvation of the wounded or at best to ease the suffering of the dying.

Huts Are a Necessity.
Now comes a call to assist in providing rest and recreation for soldiers who are risking or who are about to risk their lives for Canada and the allied cause.

Army huts are not a luxury—they are a necessity. They are of a value to the soldiers at the front and at the training camps that cannot be realized by those who are living without privation, inconvenience or discomfort of any kind. Unless one has an imagination that can picture the worst kind of homesickness and weariness of loneliness and absolute fatigue that it is possible for man to endure—and yet bear up under the strain.

Free To All Creeds.
The army huts which have been established by the Knights of Columbus in England and France are free to all, without regard to creed, class or color. Over the entrance is a sign, "Knights of Columbus. Everybody welcome." Such is the work accomplished by the efforts of their organization in the United States that K. of C. has come to stand for "Knights of Comfort." I have seen the Knights of Columbus work in operation," declared Hon. Mr. Fedick, chairman of the U. S. army training camp activities, "and I know that it is conducive to the best morale among our men."

The Canadian army huts will be erected by the Americans. They will replace many Y. M. C. A. huts that have been destroyed and will extend to even greater length the work of the Y. M. C. A. and Salvation Army.

What Soldier Is Given.
The soldier is provided, free of cost, with writing paper, newspapers and

books. He can secure refreshments, served voluntarily by the Women's League. The Canadian soldier in England is a very strange and lonesome man in a very big and unknown city, so it is a relief to him to find an army hut where he meets with a friendly reception and a kindly interest. The renting of buildings in England and the construction and furnishing of huts in France, and their maintenance, requires a large amount of money, hence this campaign throughout Canada.

Give to Girl Workers.
The need is imperative. Let the response be worthy. When you are stopped by one of the hundreds of girls who have volunteered to do the only hard part, with no reward but the consciousness of having assisted in a noble work, give according to your means, be it graciously, be it nickel, or dime, or quarter, or dollar, give it with the cheerfulness that doubles its value to the one who receives, remembering that mercy alone blesses him that gives and him that takes.

Your mite is the light behind the picture where your far-away loved one can find a spot that smells sweet and looks clean, a bed with sheets and blankets, a well-cooked meal, a bath, a table whereon to write a letter, telling you how wonderful it is that such work has been accomplished.

Let not your patriotic fervor wane the eleventh hour. Overlook the urgency of the demands in the urgency of the cause. In all your giving, your sacrifices and self-denials, come in strong at the finish.

In following the war news, think what it means to tired men coming in from the trenches, from smoke and gas, to find a haven of cleanliness. And that is what the man from the front needs more than almost anything else—a quiet, clean, restful haven that looks like home.

O'Dell, St. Louis; Mrs. George L. Wilson, Detroit; Mrs. G. Jackson, Detroit; Mrs. F. Higman of this city; Crawford, at home, and Daniel of this city. The funeral will take place at 1:30 o'clock on Saturday to the Delaware Cemetery, where interment will be made. Rev. L. Headley will conduct the services.

Burian Says Whole Central Power Ring Approved His Note

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 19.—Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, in announcing to the German deputies that the Austrian and Hungarian delegations would assemble in the first fortnight of October, is quoted in a dispatch from Vienna as saying that his note to the belligerents had been considered for weeks and was in nowise influenced by recent events on the battle front.

The foreign minister said he had taken the step alone "of course not without previously acquainting our allies of it and being certain of their approval in principle," because on the one hand the proposal had to avoid the appearance of a peace offer by the central powers, and on the other, because the proposal was to be addressed to all the belligerents.

U. S. EXPRESS RATES JUMP.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Director General McAtee has approved the application of the American Railway Express Company for further rate increases estimated to yield \$25,670,000 and has sent the proposal to the inter-state commerce commission for final action. The commission announced tonight that public hearings on the matter will begin Tuesday, October 8.
