

## AFFLICTED CLAIM TO BE HELPED BY APOSTOLIC HEALER

Lays Hands On More Than One Hundred Persons.

PRAYS FOR THEM

Denies That He Possesses Spiritualistic Powers.

New York, June 6 .- James A. Moore Hickson, the Church of England laynan apostolic healer, who, however, distinctly disavows any power to cure save through the Biblical authoritative quickening of the faith, held a public meeting yesterday at Trinity Chapel, 18 West Twenty-fifth street, where he laid hands upon about 100 persons, mostly women, and uttered prayers for

None of his 'patients' claimed to have been cured after the meeting, but their faces were lighted as if by a new born hope and their steps, for the most part legislated. part lagging as they approached Mr. Hickson, were noticeably firmer when

they departed.

Chronic Sufferers Appear.

The majority of the "patients" were clearly chronic cases who had abandoned hope of being helped by physicians. A few were so feeble that friends had to assist them to the choir, before which Mr. Hickson stood.

Each, apparently, was treated alike. Prior to the opening of the meeting a young woman passed through the audience with a notebook, jotting down names, with ailments, addresses.

The "treatment" was simplicity itself, consisting of a moment's conversation, followed by a murmured prayer by Mr. Hickson, while he laid his hands upon the "patients" heads or hips. Some of the women were in tears as they departed, but all wore smiles.

"Please do not charge me with being, a ing, or making any claim to being, a healer in my own person," said Mr. Hickson at the service's conclusion to those who had attended as observers. He said his first discovery that he had some power to help other persons came when he was with his own family. He was then 14 years old.

"I discovered then," he said, "my ability to inspire new faith in those who were discouraged by long suffering, even to the extent of their being able to resist pain and find a new vitality for getting well.
