



PORT COLBORNE **EXPLOSION WAS**

Coroner's Jury Finds That No Proposal To Go To Voters-One Was To Blame For Occurrence.

Recommendations For Avoidance of Repetition Added To Finding.

ST. CATHERINES, Sept. 10. — The coroner's jury investigating the recent elevator disaster at Port Colborne, in which ten men lost their lives, concluded its inquiry this afternoon, returning a verdict that the accident was unavoidable, and that no person was to blame, put recommending on the evit dence of experts given this afternoon that "better attention be given to all parts of the elevator when it is reconstructed," that circuit breakers be installed in all the lofters and sprinkler systems in all lofter heads, and that open granaries be eliminated in rebuilding.

Superintendent Fawcett, who was recalled pointed out that cleaning the construction of the property on South street, which has already been surveyed.

A big national advertising company of Detroit is sending five representatives here the first of the week to take panoramic photos of the harbor and industrial site.

He had visited the Port Colborne elevator about five years ago and considered it one of the finest and best equipped he had ever seen. He advanced recommendations similar to those woh made the verdict of the jury, which were confirmed by H. Waite of New York, president of the company engaged in the manufacture of elevator machinery.

Confirmatory expert testimony was also given by Dr. Brown of the United States department of agriculture, Washington, who has been present during all the sittings of the inquest. He was asked, after hearing the testimony, if he could put his finger on any person who had been guilty of negligence. His reply in the negative was quite positive. He considered the accident unavoidable. He laid some stress, however, on the desirability in the future of having circuit breakers in order to quickly check any danger from sparks resulting from friction.

Bound in Any Case.

Canada would be bound by the treaty in any case, Mr. Cockshutt thought, and would have to live up to its provisions whether or not it was now given ratification. He regretted the mixing of the peace treaty with the covenant of the league of nations, but he was going to vote for ratification. There were some clauses he did not like but he preferred to trust to the judg-ment of those who should know bet-ter than himself.

Mr. Cockshutt deplored the fact that the seat of the league was to be at Geneva, the capital of Switzerland, which had never sent a man to war and whose people had been lining their pockets with war profits. It might bet. ter have gone to Brussels, because of Belgium's suffering, or to Paris as a tribute to the Tiver of France, to whom the world owed a great debt for his work during the war and in making peace. It might even be located at London, or Washington, rather than at




