BURNABY CROSSES SWORDS WITH DRAYTON

TORONTO, Dec. 3.-Interest in the tariff commission's inquiry here was accentuated this afternoon, when R. W. E. Storing of Sugar.

In an argument with Sir Henry Drayton on the sugar question, Mr. Burnaby claimed that the storing of sugar for higher prices had exceeded anything in profiteering in cold storage. The chairman remarked that sugar control had saved the people \$27,000,000. Mr. Burnaby replied that he had not come to get into an argument on the matter.

Mr. Burnaby asserted that the collection of \$158,000,000 customs duties last year had penalized the people to the extent of \$637,000,000.

"If this form of taxation is to be maintained," said Mr. Burnaby, "in all justice an excise tax should be levied on the output of Canadian manufacturers protected by the tariff on imported articles competing therewith."




