DR. PATTERSON STRICKEN IN PHILA.

Popular Former Toronto Divine Seriously Ill From Stroke of Apoplexy— Hopes for His Recovery.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 4.—(Special.)—Rev. Dr. William Patterson, pastor of Bethany Presbyterian Church, 22nd and Bainbridge-streets, Toronto, is in a serious condition at the Presbyterian Hospital, suffering from a stroke of apoplexy.

He was stricken this afternoon at the Franklin National Bank, and was taken to the hospital in what was thought to be a dying condition. Members of his family, who are summering at Cape May, N.J., were immediately summoned to his bedside.

Dr. Patterson is one of the most distinguished of the local ministers. He is a noted orator and indefatigable church worker. His congregation is the largest downtown town.

Late reports from the hospital are to the effect that he is slightly improved and will likely recover.
