THE STEAMER BOSTON RAN SCHOONER FAME; SEVENTEEN DROWNED

Accident Occurred During Dense Fog--Schooner Was Cut Down and Only Two Members of Her Crew of Nineteen Were Saved--Survivors at Yarmouth Tell Their Story of Tragedy.

Yarmouth, N. S., May 27 (Special)—The Boston fishing schooner Fame about 90 tons, commanded by Captain Thomas Jay, a native of Newfoundland, and carrying a crew of 19 men was run into and sunk on Cape Sable at 9 o'clock last evening by the D. A. R. liner Boston Captain McKenais, which arrived here at 2 o'clock this morning from Boston.
