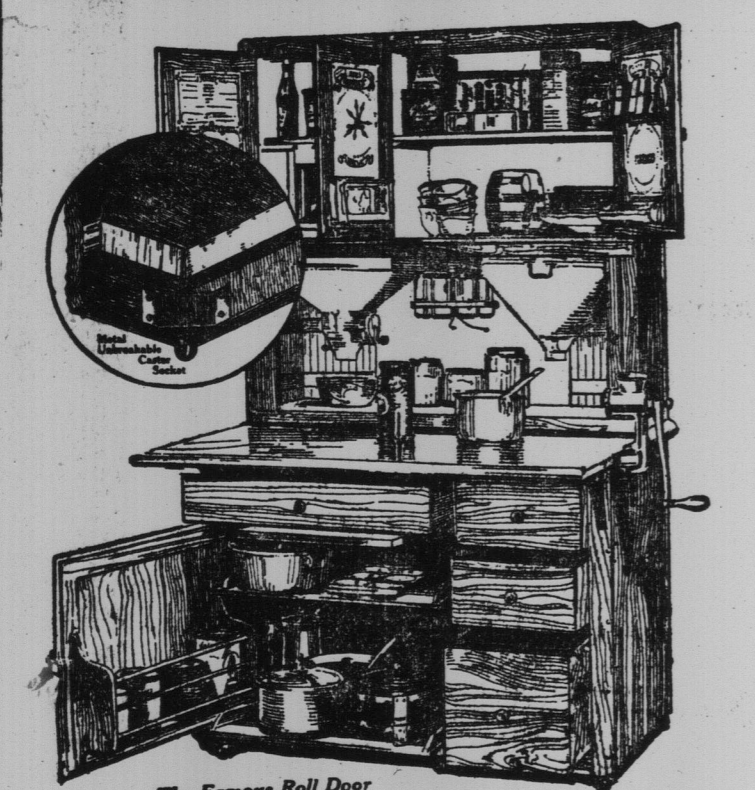

He Has Yet To See It Through

End of War Not in Sight For "Mr. Britling"
 What Britain May Expect
 Hon Winston Churchill, in Review of War Conditions, Finds Little Indication of Early Peace

A year ago the brilliant writer, H. G. Wells, whose extraordinary prescience led him in pre-war days to forecast in a series of instructive and profoundly suggestive works the coming, the character, and even many of the methods of Armageddon, took up his pen and wrote a new book under the title of "Mr. Britling Sees It Through," says Hon. Winston Churchill. He there described the sentiments, the emotions, the misadventures, the shortcomings, the misunderstandings which attended Britain's entry into the struggle and its sudden outbreak upon the world, and he carried his story forward to a stage where all the principal characters were disposed of in one way or another. His conclusion has been killed in action. The young American friend has married his daughter and is fighting with the Canadians; the old aunt has been blown to pieces by a Zeppelin. The German student recalled to his country's colors has perished in the Carpathians, and Mr. Britling, finding forgiveness in his own sorrow, has exchanged letters with the German parents.

Everything, in fact, is disposed of in one way or another except the war; the war goes on. Mr. Britling has not "seen it through" yet. Whatever his present mood may be—of resolution in the quarrel, of high hope in the future of mankind, of forgiveness of personal injuries, of dogged endurance, or dull insensibility or rebellious resentment against the powers that be—the war is still going on. Mr. Britling still has to see it through, and it may well be that experiences more moving, more tragic, more self-shattering than any through which he has yet passed are to fall to his lot before the final chapters are closed. Hopes are excited in credulous minds that the message of the Russian revolution leaping across the oceans, and the opinion of the world and the example of the Russian democracy, will by a single spontaneous effort from themselves, break the cruel and terrible machine which galls them and forces them to gall mankind.

The German Point of View.
 Sanguine dreamers, moving nimbly in the attenuated ether of ideas, can almost see the German nation, market at last its own house, decreeing the liberation of imprisoned nationalities, directing the reparation of the ravaged regions, breaking the sword that threatens them and us alike, and confidently taking their own great place among the free nations of the world. But the soaring flight of such ideas is abruptly checked by contact with reality. What reasons have we to suppose that the mass of the German people have any such hopes? If they have it will manifest itself in an effective form? They see themselves fighting a world of enemies. They began the war blithely in the belief that they would conquer a supreme domination for themselves and for their race forever. They believe today that although the war has been a disaster for them and its sufferings and perils are immeasurably greater than any they had expected, still, thanks to their military institutions, to their Germanic spirit, to their own heroism and their sense of duty, they have the power to extricate themselves from this terrific adventure without defeat or penalty. They are the most powerful elements among them still hope to add large conquered regions to the German Empire and to open up through the Balkans and Turkey avenues of future aggrandizement in the East.

The End Not in Sight.
 Why should we suppose in these circumstances that the German people should repudiate and overthrow those with their own eyes? They can see the devastation of the war from German soil, which have been their idol through years of peace and are still and stout bulwark today? The history of other great quarrels should correct sanguine anticipations of an early and complete victory. Certainly they should forbid us to base our actions upon any such hopeful view. Long after Napoleon's campaign of 1812, after the Leipzig campaign of 1813, the French armies continued mechanically to obey his commands and to fight with the utmost tenacity. The important battle of Toulongne was actually fought after Paris had capitulated.

The hopes of the American Confederates were shattered irrevocably on the battlefield of Gettysburg, but two years later the bloodiest fighting of the war still lay before the Northern troops and the army of Virginia continued to strike resounding blows long after all hope and fuel when nothing remained but a solitary resistance for its own sake.
 Sea Power Over All.
 Once again, continues Mr. Churchill in the New York Sun, as at the beginning of the great war, sea power will decide the fortunes of the world. Once again, though threatened as it never was before, the Royal Navy will do its duty and achieve its purpose. It will be by those qualities of discipline, efficiency and devotion which have never been found wanting, but in that mental energy and intellectual passion which, freed from conventional limitations, heralds the birth of rare enterprises and the rise of great captains. Sure of this, Mr. Britling will not waver. He will look back to the true and pure and disinterested feelings with which he began this work. He will make sure that he seeks nothing which divorces him from contact with those feelings; he will make sure that he accepts nothing that does not fully satisfy those feelings.

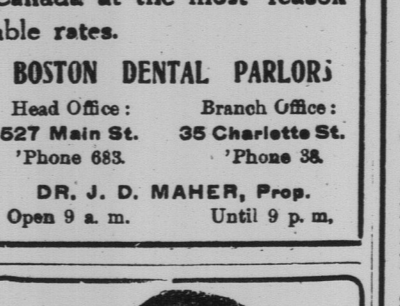
