Archbishop McEvoy Ill

Detroit, Mich., June 23.—It is learned in a message from Mount Clemens that Archbishop McEvoy, of Toronto, who arrived at the bath three weeks ago, is seriously ill. Since becoming the head of the Archdiocese of Toronto a year ago, His Grace has been straining his strength in the effort to realize certain improvements and extensions in the work and spirit of his church. He has overtaken himself and is said to be suffering from an organic trouble, believed to be diabetes. Once coming to the bath three weeks ago his condition has shown no improvement, raising the contrary, and his health is rather much unsteady.

Bombardment of Town Tonight

Bluelishes, Nicaragua, June 24.—Further reports from General Menz, whose 1,500 men occupy a strong position outside of Acopags, state that twelve hours' notice has been given to non-combatants to leave the town before a bombardment is begun. General Vasquez, in command within the town, it is said, has refused permission to the non-combatants to leave, fearing that they would join the Estrada army. It is believed that the town will be attacked by General Menz tonight. General Vasquez has less than 900 men in the garrison.
