Actually now, the stock market is not being influenced by trade developments, but by fear. No one can tell how long the selling movements on such a basis will continue, but a good many people now believe that stocks are cheap and there is a little good buying in certain issues. Today, after some selling, the market should improve to some extent, but there is no sign that the reactionary tendencies have been completed.

As long as the street feels the way it does now, all rallies will meet liquidation. Incidentally, the short interest in the market seems to be increasing every day.
