AN INSPIRING OPEN AIR MEETING IN BEACONSFIELD

Large Audiences Listen With
Attention to Spirited Ad-
dresses by E. H. McAlpine,
A. W. Carton and J. A.
Barry.

The Liberals of Beaconsfield were out
in full force for the open air rally held
last night in Lancaster Avenue with J.
E. Murray as chairman. The City Cor-
poration band was in attendance and pro-
vided an excellent programme of music.
An opposition meeting was held in the
school house at Beaconsfield last night.

Barry. The enthusiasm of the big
crowd was keen and loud applause
showed approval of the statements made
and the sentiments expressed. The
meeting began at 8.45 and lasted until
nearly 11 o'clock, and Lancaster Ave-
ue was thronged with eager listeners.
Mr. Carton reviewed the road policy
of the government and told of what it
had brought in magnificent roads
throughout the province.
Mr. McAlpine touched upon the bene-
fits of the health act, the educational
policy, and also spoke of the road pol-
icy of the Roster administration.
Mr. Barry spoke of the election as be-
ing one where the people might bring
benefit to themselves, as by electing A.
F. Bentley to represent them they would
endorse the hydro-electric policy of the
government, and there should not have
been a by-election, because to elect Dr.
J. H. Barton would be simply playing
into the hands of the New Brunswick
Power Company and would not encour-
age the government to carry on the hy-
dro-electric policy with the same spirit
as if the government supporter was
elected.
The meeting augured well for the suc-
cess of the Liberal candidate at the
polls.

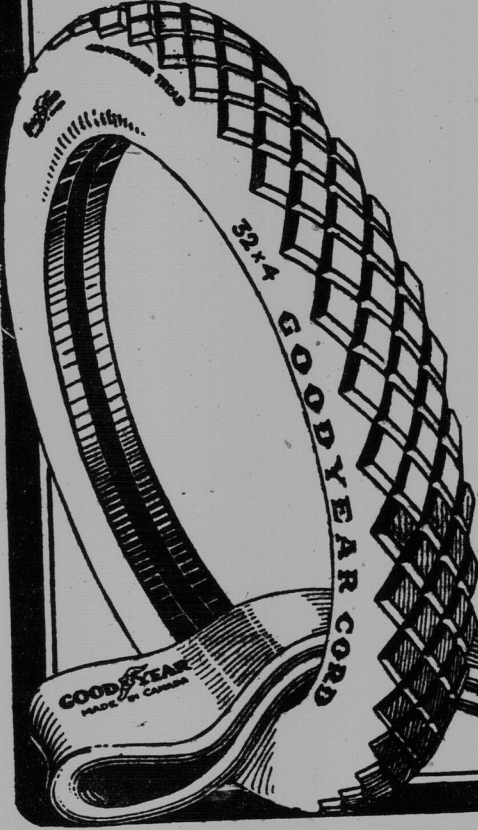
