

"Book Corner" Is a Real "Book Store"

Can every small space, in newspaper advertising be made effective? Is it possible, for example, to so compose a single column three or four inch display that it will hold its own against much larger advertisements and big, bold illustrations, headlines, etc?

A retail bookshop believes that it has achieved what many merchants deem impossible in this regard.

A very small single column newspaper advertisement, used daily, has made New York "sit up and take notice," despite heavy competition.

This is how it was done in question is situated on a prominent corner—Twenty-eighth street and Fifth avenue, to be exact—and it is known as "The Book Corner."

An artist has drawn a simple outline picture of an enormous book, spraddled open. It is placed in such a position that it literally forms the building on the corner, yet never for a moment loses its identity as a book. The
covers of the book form two sides of
the building and the appearance of great

tiny figures, customers, etc., on the pavement at the base.

Show windows have been cut in these
covers, and on them also appears the covers, and on them also appears the catch phrase used by the concern: "A Corner in Books—The Book Corner."

forming a store of a great book that makes people stop and notice the little one-column advertisement.
