
Fairville Crossing to Be Protected -Fredericton Passenger Rates -The Milk Question Comes in For Some Consideration

A session of the Board of Railway ioners was held in St, John today to hear arguments on several appli-

On the protest of the Fredericton Board of Trade that the railway pas-senger rates from Fredericton to Boston and other points west of Vanceboro were greater, in proportion, than to Moncton and to other points east of Fredericton, the Board postponed decis-ion until further information regarding the exact rates could be secured and furnished. Counsel for the Fredericton Board of Trade drew attention to the desirability of both C. P. R. and I. C. R. using the same station, but the board said they had no jurisdiction in such a matter.
