

RUSSIANS GOING HOME.

Within the past few days thirty Russians have bought tickets at Fredericton and started for Montreal. Other Russians came to Fredericton on Saturday and tried to buy tickets, and again on Monday. The C. P. R.'s city ticket office there has been besieged by Russians wanting to buy tickets to go home to fight, but they were all doomed to disappointment. Instructions have been issued by W. B. Howard, the C. P. R's district passenger agent at St. John, to discontinue bookings of all continental and Scandinavian passengers east bound until further advised. "Do not accept prepaids," says the telegraphic advice. "Antwerp service has been called off, and for the present steamers of Antwerp service will operate to and from London, Rngland, only."
