SMALLPOX IN KING'S.
Sussex Record.—Kings has another smallpox outbreak on its hands. A few days ago a case was discovered in the home of an Indian at Havelock. Dr. Thomas pronounced it smallpox but a number of people went to the Indian's home and now they, too, are under quarantine. The matter was reported to Dr. Hastings of Hampton, county health officer, who went to Havelock and established a quarantine and vaccinated members of four families. The Indian has been very ill. The case has developed a bad type of the disease.

FIFTY-FOUR WERE ADDED DURING YEAR

Victoria Street Church—Annual Meeting Held—Sunday School Numbers 693

The annual meeting of the Victoria street United Baptist church, Rev. Benjamin H. Nobles, pastor, was held this week and reports were read and officers elected for the ensuing year. All reports indicated that the church was in excellent condition. George M. Barker, treasurer, reported receipts of \$1,907.35, and expenditures \$1,674.10, leaving a balance of \$233.25. The report of the church clerk, among many interesting items, showed an addition of fifty-four to the church membership during the year.

The sum of \$292 was raised for missionary funds, making total contribution of \$286.24 for missions.

HEARST FAILS TO GET CANADIAN PULP MILLS

Sturgeon Falls Options Are All Dropped and Property Will Be Sold by Auction

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 13.—E. C. Clarksen, special liquidator of the Sturgeon Falls Pulp and Sulphite mills in 1907, announces that the requests for options on the property had all been declined, and that the shareholders, who met in London, England, yesterday, decided to sell the property at auction early in April.
The mills have an estimated value of \$1,200,000 and hold valuable pulp concessions. One of the applicants for options was William R. Hearst of New York, newspaper owner.
