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## FIFTY YEARS OF MARRIED LIFE CELEBRATED

Old Times Recalled by Wed-  
ding Anniversary of Mr.  
and Mrs. John H. Marks.

(Moncton Transcript, Monday)  
Mr. and Mrs. John H. Marks are today celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage, and Moncton citizens unite in congratulating this esteemed couple on the happy event and in wishing them many years to come of wedded happiness. Few residents of Moncton are held in as high respect by their fellow citizens as Mr. and Mrs. Marks. The whole half century has been spent in this city. They have taken an active part in the life of the community and their influence has always been for the best. In social matters, in church matters

and in all useful spheres Mr. and Mrs. Marks have given of their time and means and the community is better on account of their efforts. In the business life of the city, Mr. Marks has always been a prominent figure, well known for his uprightness and integrity which acquired for him the wide circle of friends which also came to Mrs. Marks in her domestic associations.

Mr. Marks has been an elder of St. John's Presbyterian Church for thirty-six years and has always taken an active part in the government of this institution. At 11 o'clock on the morning of April 30th, 1873, at the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Petitediac, was performed a ceremony by the Rev. Culbert Willis uniting in the holy bonds of matrimony Augustus A. Humphreys and John H. Marks. Fifty years have elapsed since that event took place and Mr. and Mrs. Marks are celebrating the anniversary in their quiet way today with their children and grandchildren at their home, 185 Botsford street.

Mr. Marks was born in Ireland in 1844, emigrating in 1870 to Portland, Maine. In 1870 with a Mr. Charles F. Merriam of Maine, he engaged in the manufacture of carriages and sleighs, in a factory situated at the corner of Polle River Road and Ballway street, Petitediac. Their goods soon acquired a reputation for excellence, but the market proximity to Petitediac being limited, Mr. Marks decided that the fast growing town of Moncton offered greater possibilities for his business and removed here about the year 1872. His partner Mr. Merriam returned to his former home. Mr. Marks' carriage factory was located on Mechanic street, and as in Petitediac his carriages soon became popular. Honest workmanship was his objective and proof of this fact is that some of his carriages are on the roads today, after thirty-five years of continuous use. Fire destroyed his plant on no less than four occasions and handicapped as he was by heavy losses, he built three times. After the last fire in 1914 which devastated

Mechanic street and included his factory, he decided owing to advancing years and the increasing use of motor vehicles, to retire from business. Owning considerable property in this district, he developed it by building warehouses which have been a means of attracting several large outside concerns to Moncton. His business was not his only occupation. He has been an elder in the Presbyterian church for several years, and a pillar of strength to that institution. He has also served as a director of the Y. M. C. A. For years he held the office of Chief of the Fire Department of this city. Although retired from business, Mr. Marks still remains active and his faculties are unimpaired.

During all these years Mr. Marks has been a faithful wife and helpful partner. She has retained much of the youthful charm and vigour she displayed as a bride on that beautiful April morning fifty years ago. She was the eldest daughter of Mr. Hiram Humphreys and his wife Mary Crawford, who early settled at the "Head of the Petitediac," the official name of the Post Office which was the largest trading centre between Sussex and Moncton. There was no Petitediac Village until after the year 1857. Her parents were of direct Loyalist descent. Mr. Humphreys conducted a general store business which he established during the year 1848. It is interesting to hear that Mrs. Marks recalls the condition of this part of the province before the railway was built and when Moncton was only a village.

Mr. and Mrs. Marks had eight children who with the exception of Mrs. S. O. Humphreys are still living. The children are: Ex-Ald. William E. Marks of this city; Miss Ada and Miss Georgia at home; Mrs. Horatio McKenna of this city; Mrs. D. W. H. Magee of St. John; Mrs. J. T. Crilly and Mr. Harry Marks of this city. They also have eleven grandchildren.

It might be mentioned that while Mr. Marks is quite an aged man he has not had many birthdays, because he was born on the 29th of February.

## WHAT IS EXPECTED OF SCHOOL NURSE

(United States Public Health Service.)  
The school nurse, says the United States Public Health Service in a recent release, should have good health, sound anatomy, tactful and equable temperament, and love for and understanding of children. In addition to her regular training and health work she would better have some experience in public health nursing, in the essentials of nutrition, and in school sanitation. If she also possesses some knowledge of matters that seem more properly to belong to the work of the school physician, so much the better.

In general, one nurse should be assigned to from 1,000 to 2,000 pupils, the exact number depending on the physical conditions prevailing in the school district. In rural communities lack of funds usually compels an increase in the quota of children assigned to one nurse. If the school nurses are under the jurisdiction of the health authorities, public health and school work can be combined, thus greatly reducing duplication in home visiting; in this case the quota assigned to one nurse might be reduced to 500.

The "routine" duties of each school nurse, whether working with a full time or a half time health officer, comprise: (1) A daily meeting, preferably in the morning, in a room set aside for the purpose, for the inspection, instruction, and disposition of all children referred to her who are suspected to be suffering from communicable diseases, or from parasitic skin infections, or from any complaint calling for emergency help; (2) frequent inspections of classrooms for discovering unreported cases of communicable diseases, and for unsanitary conditions, such as poor ventilation, and illumination of rooms and the seating of the pupils; (3) giving oral instruction to pupils and to teachers; (4) doing follow-up work; and (5) observing the sanitary condition of the school buildings and grounds.

Special duties depend a good deal on whether the school physician is working on whole or half time. Where whole-time physicians are employed the work of the nurse is commonly confined to assist them; where volunteer

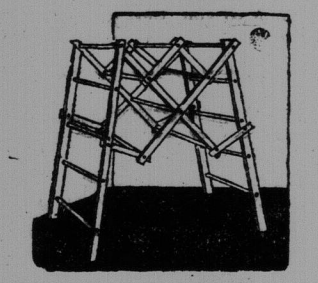

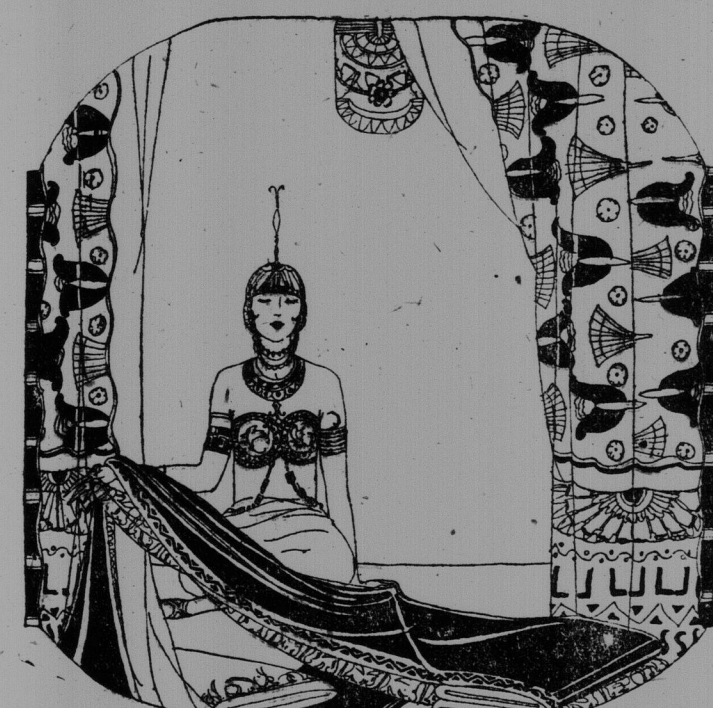
