

SCARCITY OF WATER CLOSES SAW MILL

About 30 Employed in
Lorneville Enterprise —
May Resume Tuesday

The portable mill at Black Beach, Lorneville, which is operated by A. J. Wheaton, Water street, West St. John, has been shut down for a few days owing to the scarcity of water supply, but is expected to begin operations again on Tuesday. The water for running the mill is obtained from small brooks and shallow wells. Owing to the continued frost the wells are frozen to the bottom. The present thaw has made water procurable again. The freezing of wells during the winter months in country districts is a common occurrence, and farmers have been known to drive their cattle for miles to procure water for them.

Mr. Wheaton's mill turns out about 4,000,000 feet of logs during a winter season. The logs are brought to West St. John on snows where part of them find a ready market. A large quantity is also sent to the United States. The mill employs about 30 men, the majority being from Lorneville. The lumber is procured on the property of nearby residents. Many of these trees rise to a height of 18, 20 or 30 feet and they average about four and a half feet in circumference at the base.

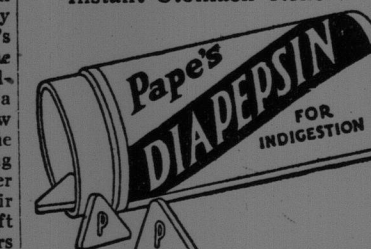

HOUSE ADJOURNS TO TUESDAY P. M.

Short Session Held at Capital
When Standing Committees Are Named

Fredericton, March 7.—The House only sat a few minutes this afternoon. After the usual formality of prayers and the reading of the Journal, the report of the committee to nominate standing committees was submitted and adopted.

Dr. L. M. Curran, M. P. P. for the county of St. John, arrived this morning and was in his seat for the afternoon session. The whole group of opposition members are not here yet, B. V. Dickson, of Kings county, being absent. It is understood that there has been no formal caucus outlining the programme of Opposition legislation, but there is plenty of time for that. That veteran parliamentarian, James K. Pinder, took his seat quietly on the day of the opening and one could not judge from his impassive countenance whether there is some rumor of a caucus of the Government supporters Tuesday evening, when Premier Veniot will probably adjourn the debate upon the address.

In the afternoon the Opposition Leader, Mr. Richards, will make his first criticism of the Government administration for last year and he will be followed by Mr. A. C. Fawcett, the Farmer Leader from the County of Westmorland.

If there is any meeting of the Government supporters on Tuesday evening it may be for the purpose of obtaining further information with regard to the Grand Falls development, based upon the reports of Engineer Acres who made the investigation for the Government.

Hon. Mr. Veniot submitted the report of the committee appointed to nominate all standing committees. Hon. Mr. Robinson submitted the report and resolutions adopted by the British Forestry Conference at their meeting in Canada last year.

Hon. Mr. Hetherington submitted the annual report of the Provincial Hospital for the year 1923.

Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced a bill to consolidate and amend "The rates of taxes act, 1923."

Hon. Mr. Meserach submitted the annual report of the Department of Agriculture.

Hon. Mr. Veniot announced that the contingencies committee would meet on Wednesday morning.

Adjourned at 3.30 p. m. until Tuesday at 2 p. m.

SAYS SUGAR CROP MAY PASS AVERAGE

Returning Bank Manager
Says Havana is Thronged
With Tourists

That the sugar crop of Cuba, averaging annually more than 3,000,000 tons, probably this year to equal, if not surpass, the crops of recent years, was the statement of G. Cameron, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, in the city yesterday, en route to his former home in Charlottetown on six months' leave of absence.

The price for raw sugar prevailing in Cuba at present, he said, was 5 1/2 cents a pound, and was well up to the average. The planters were optimistic and there was every indication that business, as far as sugar was concerned, would be bright in Cuba this year.

Commenting on the large shipments of potatoes to Havana, Mr. Cameron said that this was due in a large measure to the demand for potatoes by large numbers of tourists who are thronging the country. Most of the tourists were Americans and they were so numerous that at the moment a person wishing to visit Havana would in all probability have to wait several weeks before getting accommodation.

Sugar Plantation Wages.

Not only were the hotels crowded, but it was next to impossible to get accommodation on the trains unless reserved days in advance.

The sugar plantations, Mr. Cameron said, sometimes employed as many as 1,500 to 2,000 native laborers. Their wages range as high as \$1.25 per day, according to amount of cane they cut. A plantation has sometimes as much as 25 miles of railway running through it, which is operated by the owner himself to transport the cane to the mill and the sugar from the mill. The refineries, where the raw sugar was extracted from the cane, were of the most modern type, he said, but in transporting the sugar to the shipping centres the growers used oxen and heavy carts. They stick to this means of transportation because it is cheap and sure.

Honest in Business.

Speaking as a banker, Mr. Cameron said that the business morality of the people of the islands was very high. He instanced the case of a person who had failed to pay a draft drawn on him by a firm in the United States and who was waited on by a member of the firm who inquired why the draft had not been paid. The Cuban assured him that he had received the firm's goods and had accepted the draft, but had not paid it because it was not convenient for him to pay just then. He furthermore thought that the fact that he had not paid the draft was sufficient evidence that he could not pay conveniently and rather resented the act of the company in sending a representative to ask why he had not paid when they should have understood that the bill would have been paid, had he been able to pay it.

Mr. Cameron first went to Cuba in 1909 with the intention of staying for the winter. He has been there ever since, but not for 18 years in the same place. He has been in practically every branch of the Royal Bank of Canada in the south.

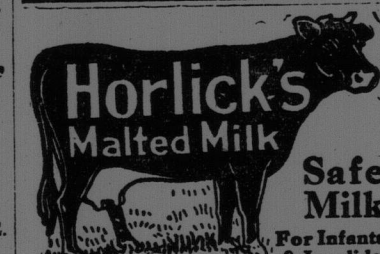
