On the morning of 17 Dec 43, I was called by Lieut. I.C.Wood who reported the loss of his purse. I then called Pte.Lilley, his batman, who was on duty that morning, and as such had access to Lieut.Wood's room. With Pte.Lilley, I made a search of the room, also the bed and linen, but could not find any evidence of the wallet or contents. Then all the batmen in the quarters volunteered to be searched. This was carried out, and the missing money, wallet or other papers was not found.

FOURTH
WITNESS

Mr. Daniel Campbell, Kentville, N.S., having been duly sworn, states:--
On the evening of 17 Dec 43 the accused came into McLeod & Balcolms Drug store and asked me to keep a sum of money. I asked him "how much" and he answered \$40.00. I told him I would keep it for him. This money was in denominations of four Ten Dollar bills. I put these bills into one of the "Firm" envelopes and gave the accused a receipt for same. I recognise Exhibit "A" as the above-mentioned receipt, and Exhibit "B" as the envelope in question. On 20 Dec 43, Lieut.Morris came into the store with the receipt, marked Exhibit "B", which he showed me, and asked for the money. We then opened the envelope which is Exhibit "B" and found the original four Ten Dollar Bills, which I handed over to Lieut.Morris. He gave me a receipt for the original receipt marked Exhibit "A" and also a receipt for the money. I offer this receipt as evidence. (This receipt was shown to the accused and marked Exhibit "C"). The accused told me at the time, that this was money he had received from home, and he did not want to keep it in the Camp.
