PARADE OF ORANGE LODGE OF COLEY'S POINT

Dashing Schomberg Orange Lodge of Coley's Point, held their annual Parade on New Year's Day. Accompanied by the C. L. B. Scouts, Shearstown Orange and their own Band, the Orangemen left their hall and proceeded west on the south side of the Point to the Methodist Church, where Divine Service was held, the preacher being Rev. (Bro.) Samuel Baggs. The church was filled to its entire capacity. Several well-known hymns were sung and a selection by each of the four bands were rendered.
The address was based on the words found in Isaiah 32.2, "And a man shall be as a hiding place from the tempest; as rivers of water in a dry place; as the shadow of a rock in a weary land."
Mr. Baggs beautifully illustrated his text by referring to conditions existing in a desert, and then applied the lesson to the Orange Association, and what it means to Protestantism. The address was highly appreciated by all who were present. The service closed by the singing of the National Anthem.
The Society then proceeded west to Country Road, and returning east disbanded at their hall for dinner. During the parade steps were made at the homes of several sick and aged brethren, when hand selections were played. After dinner the hall was packed with men, women and children. The newly-elected master, Bro. Harold Morgan, presided, and conducted the meeting in a very satisfactory manner. Brief patriotic addresses were delivered by several Orangemen, between which selections were played by the bands. The National Anthem brought the days proceedings to a close.

CHURCH PARADE

On Sunday afternoon, Dec. 30th, the Girl Guides and Boy Scouts, accompanied by the Scout band, attended Divine Service at Coley's Pt. Methodist Church.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY
Section 137 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1906, ss. 137.
No person shall establish install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Newfoundland except under and in accordance with a license granted by the Post Office.
