# IRISH AFFAIRS. LONDON, Jan. 20.—A deputation of loyalists from Uister today waited on the Marquis of Hartington, war secretary under Gladstone. They pointed out that in Ireland the legal power of the Queen's writ does not run outside of Ulster and said they feared that the terror-ism existing in the south and west of Ireland would extend to Ulster unless it was checked. The marquis advised the deputation to do their utmost to enlist the sympathy of the English people in their cause.
