Russia Has 20,000 Troops Ready to Leap on Corea - Fleet Ready for Action.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—A despatch to the Central News Agency from Tokio says the newspapers there publish telegrams saying that 20,000 Russian troops have been placed in the Yalu valley with the probable intention of seizing North Korea. It is added that hope of maintaining peace has been abandoned.
