CHICAGO, Sept. 23. — Yellow journalism was emphasized as one of the greatest menaces to the reformation of outcast women in an address made today by Mrs. Emma O'Sullivan, of Toronto, before the Prison Association of America, now in session at the Auditor jum Hotel. Mrs. O'Sullivan is superjittedent of the Andrew Mercer Residue. intendent of the Andrew Mercer Re

"The different processes through which a woman has to pass seem calculated to tear away the last shred of her self-respect," said Mrs. O'Sullivan. "Why can we not have privacy in hearings of cases against women? This is done in Boston, where a woman, upon being arrested, is taken directly to the detention prison for women, held there until her hearing, which is entirely separate from other cases, and if sentenced, is taken to the special prison."

TUBERCULOSIS INOCULATOR.

VIENNA, Sept. 23—At the International Tuberculosis Conference today Dr. Pirquet read a report of his exthis evening at the association's rooms.

Dr. Pirquet read a report of his experiments in inoculating infants with tuberculin to detect the presence of tuberculosis germs. The experiments showed that inoculation had no effect on healthy children, but where germs existed reaction was shown by soreness and scarifications, although no fever or other harmful effect followed. The delegates were impressed by the report, and many of them were convinced that a valuable discovery had been made.
