HILARIOUS FIREMAN FELL OVER THE WHARF

Slaker From the Governor Cobb Was Sobered by an Unexpected Ducking This Morning.

An exciting five minutes was experienced by officers and men of the Governor Cobb while leaving the dock this morning, in rescuing a member of the crew who had fallen overboard. The steamer has just cast off from the wharf when a belated fireman--who had spent a rather hilarious night on shore--agreed down the slip and in an effort to jump aboard the boat was precipitated to the water below.

Willing hands were immediately to the rescue and another of the crew was lowered by a rope to the water, where, after taking a few strokes, he succeeded in grasping his friend, who was soon safely landed on deck considerably sobered by his impromptu bath.
