HIGHWAY ROBBERY ON PRINCE WILLIAM STREET

Nervy Thug Grabbed Hand Bag and Money from Young Woman and Got Away with it.

She describes the thief as a young man wearing a light green colored suit of clothes and also a soft hat.

Bridgeport, Conn., May 3.—The two-masted lumber schooner *Parma*, of Chester, N. S., from that port for City Island, N. Y., grounded on Penfield Reef during last night, suffering considerable injury to her hull. She was hauled off today by a tug and brought in for examination. If her hull is found not too badly damaged she will proceed tomorrow. The grounding was due to mistaking the Starboard light for that of Middle Ground.

NATIVE OF ST. JOHN; DIED IN ST. STEPHEN

Thomas Crawford Formerly of this City, Passed Away in Border Town - Was in Piano Business.

Special to The Standard. St. Stephen, May 3.—After a brief illness with pneumonia, Thomas Crawford passed away at his home, on King street, at five o'clock this morning. He was seventy-four years of age and was survived by a widow, Mr. Crawford was a native of St. John but had been in the organ and sewing machine business here for the past eighteen years and was highly respected. In religion he was a Methodist and in politics a staunch conservative. His brother, Dr. G. R. J. Crawford, of St. John, was with him in his last illness. The remains will be taken to St. John in the morning for interment.

NEWFOUNDLAND WANTS FISH FREE INTO UNITED STATES

Boston, Mass., May 3.—Sir Edward Morris, prime minister of Newfoundland, in an interview here said that in his opinion, the United States government owed it to Newfoundland to place fish on the list of imports free of duty. He said that Newfoundland had removed the duties from many American articles and that free fish should be granted as a reciprocal matter. He argued that the United States had offered such a concession to Canada and should do so to Newfoundland.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

New York, May 3.—While the tone of early foreign cables was considerably favorable and the general weather reports bullish today's cotton market reflected little buying power and an apparent total lack of bull leadership. An early recovery seemed due to purely technical causes and on the buying by scattered shorts and a small reactionist contingent had run its course, prices ran off with ease and the final tone was heavy. The spot situation has come to the fore as a market factor and it is beginning to be a question whether the old crop will be absorbed before the new yield is available for spinners. The big bulls show no disposition to take issue on this question and indeed are maintaining ostensible indifference when lends color to the belief that they would not be averse to a better buying basis. Crop reports are better but in this particular condition are not such as to warrant aggressive bear operations. The smaller acreage and the lateness of planting will sooner or later become assertive factors but not apparently until the bull leaders have recovered their lines and are ready to resume an aggressive campaign for the rise.

UNCLE SAM TO SEE FAIR PLAY

United States Will Intervene in Panama Elections to See They Are Fairly Conducted.

Panama, May 3.—The United States government has been requested to intervene in the presidential election in Panama to the extent of seeing that it is fairly conducted. This fact was admitted today by President Arosemena in an interview with the Associated Press. He said that the directorate of the Union Patriotic, the name given a party composed of friends of President Arosemena and Pedro A. Diaz, the official candidate for the presidency, has asked for American intervention such as was accorded in the elections of 1903, when Secretary of War Taft informed the Panama government that the election must be conducted fairly. President Arosemena added that the American government would welcome such intervention. The directors of the liberal and conservative parties also say they have requested the United States government to see to it that the election is a fair one.

These requests are taken here to indicate that the political situation in the republic is a delicate one. The reports of rioting yesterday at Dolega, following an address by Dr. Bellio Perra, another candidate for the presidency, created a great sensation throughout the country. The situation is practically beyond the control of the political leaders, and passions run so high, that it is feared some incident may result in a configuration.

Toronto, May 3.—At midnight Judge Mabee, chairman of the Dominion Railway Commission, was reported to be resting quietly after his second operation today. No immediate change for the worse is looked for by his medical men.

They will remain in the city until Sunday afternoon and an extensive program of entertainments has been mapped out.

The visitors got their first greeting from Canadians at St. John, where Senator Dandurand, president of the Canadian France-America committee and a delegation from this city welcomed them. The visitors expressed themselves as delighted at the warmth of the welcome tendered them in the United States, but they declared they had experienced nothing there which they appreciated so much as their welcome at St. John, where hundreds of French voices greeted them with the *Marsellaise*.

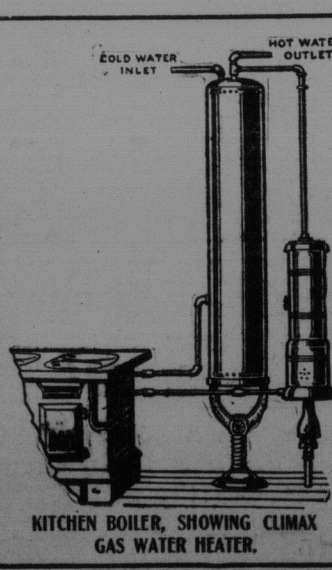
