## C. B. ALLEN TO BE CHAIRMAN OF ASSESSORS

Will succeed Mr. A. W.  
Sharpe — Appointment  
made at yesterday's  
council meeting

C. B. Allen was chosen to fill the  
position of chairman of the board of  
assessors made vacant by the resigna-  
tion of A. W. Sharpe at the meeting  
of the common council at noon yester-  
day. The salary will remain at the  
same figure that was paid to Mr.  
Sharpe, \$2,000. After a private con-  
ference of the commissioners the  
mayor moved, seconded by Com. Wig-  
more, that Mr. Allen be appointed and  
the motion was unanimously carried.  
The resolution of Com. Potts that the  
flat rate of 1.58 be continued for an-  
other five years caused considerable  
discussion and was finally defeated by  
the casting vote of the mayor.

The mayor and Com. McLellan both  
contended that it would be unwise at  
this time to tie the hands of the assess-  
ors as it was impossible to tell how  
much money would be required next  
year, or any year, until this war was  
over.

Com. Russell said it might be pos-  
sible that a rate as high as 2.10 would  
be necessary next year. Coms. Potts  
and Wigmore voted in favor of Com.  
McLellan and Russell and the mayor  
against the proposal.

The housing bill of Com. Potts was  
adopted after some discussion, during  
which Com. Potts claimed the credit  
for the appointment of the Assessment  
Commission. In urging the passing of  
the housing bill Com. Potts said he  
had put this proposal forward in the  
interest of morals and better living  
conditions among the laboring classes.  
There were houses in Saint John not  
fit for a decent dog to live in and yet  
men and women were allowed to stay  
in them. He said in the course of his  
remarks that he did not expect to be  
a commissioner after the first of May  
as he did not intend to run again for  
office. Com. McLellan seconded the  
motion and Com. Wigmore, in support-  
ing it, said that some of the houses  
in Saint John certainly were not fit  
for human habitation.

A communication was read from J.  
A. Barry asking if the fee of the Carle-  
ton Mill Pond were for sale or whether  
a lease would be given. This was re-  
ferred to the Commissioner of Ferries  
and Public Lands for a report. The  
request of the Automobile Association  
that a change be made in the by-laws  
regarding the rule of the road and  
suggesting that it be made to read that  
vehicles drive to the right instead of  
the left was referred to the Commis-  
sioner of Public Safety.

## CONCERT PROVED A MUSICAL TREAT

Entertainment under aus-  
pices of King's Daugh-  
ters one of most delight-  
ful of season

When it was announced from the  
platform at the concert held under  
the auspices of the King's Daughters  
of St. John, at the High School, last  
night, that the Chevalier Rodolfo  
Formai, would be unable to fulfil his  
engagement, a shadow of disappoint-  
ment passed over the faces of the  
large audience, but this quickly  
passed away as the various artists went on  
with the programme. Nearly one thou-  
sand and people were present, and as Miss  
Mercedes Edwards concluded Chopin's  
Scherzo in C sharp minor, they ex-  
pressed their highest appreciation of  
her exquisite rendering of a piece  
which required such perfect touch.

Miss Carmelita Wilkes who followed  
proved to have a most charming voice,  
not only splendidly trained, but used  
with that ease and grace which is  
lacking among many who occupy the  
concert platform. In her first solo,  
"Bird on the Wing," by Zay, her fine  
personality was at once in evidence,  
and in the four remaining pieces,  
Mascagni's "He Loves Me, He Loves  
Me Not," "Ecstasy," by Beach, Fri-  
m's "Bohemian Folk Song," and the  
"Cuckoo" by Lehman, her voice was  
heard to the best advantage, particu-  
larly in the last named. She also  
sang, later in the evening, "Beaming  
Eyes," a moral song, and "Annie  
Laurie," with equal effect. Miss  
Wilkes' enunciation was very clear.

The audience were next treated to  
Karel Havlicek's exquisite violin play-  
ing in "Symphonie Espagnole," first  
movement, and later in Viennese  
Popular Song, by Kreisler, "Wies-  
enried" by Schubert, and Popper's  
"Elfenfantz." These pieces, a test for  
any artist, were handled with perfect  
control, his tone and expression being  
most marked. The last two which  
were great contrasts, one a cradle  
song, and the other quite rollicking,  
proved him to be an artist of no mean  
merit. It may be added that he used  
the double stop, and mute, most skill-  
fully.

Miss Mercedes Edwards who accom-  
panied the musician, throughout, de-  
serves particular mention with refer-  
ence to name, as in it she proved her  
skilful handling of, to some, a difficult  
part, to a great degree, in fact many  
who are accustomed to accompany  
singers might well take a leaf from  
her book. In her solo playing she  
gave the singing tone beautifully, and  
brought out perfect expressions in  
"Rhapsodie."
