OTTOMAN EMPIRE OUT OF THE WAR

Armistice Became Effective at Noon Yesterday -Allied War Vessels Pass Through Bosphorous and Turkish Forts Occupied - - - British Prisoners Released-Surrender of Turkish Armies in Mesopotamia.

London, Oct. 31-(Canadian Press despatch from Reuter's Ltd.)-In the House of Commons today Sir George Cave, the home secretary, announced that an armistice between Turkey and the Allies had been signed last night and came into operation at noon today.

The full terms of the armistice includes a free passage for the fleet through the Bosphorus to the Black Sea; the occupation of the forts of the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles, necessary to secure such passage and the immediate repatriation of the British prisoners.

Ismal Hakki, commanding the Turkish armies of the group operating in the Tigris region in Mesopotamia, has surrendered with one entire division and the best part on other divisions, the Evening Standard says.
