St. John the number will be very greatly increased. It is understood that an arrangement has been made by which the successful tenderers for the dry dock will take over the franchise granted to the Imperial Dry Pock Company. This will enable the patriotic citizens who backed this proposi-tion with their eash to recover some of the money expended and will allow the new firm to secure the subsidies promised to the Imperial Dry Dock Company with-out further legislation, as this transfer was authorized by an amendment to the pro-vincial act in 1907. The subsidy promised by the city was \$2,500 a year for forty years and this was afterwards changed to \$5,000 a year for twenty years. The pro-vincial government has also promised sub-stantial aid to the undersching. Among the other arrangements which have been made for the commencement of the construction work here it is said that

If they secure the St. John contract their head office will probably be moved from Vancouver to this city.
