### Millions From Nothing

PUBLISHER'S COUNSEL SHOWS ACTUAL OF STUMPAGE.

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—Startling figures as to the value of gifts which the Governments have made to paper companies and which are now being included by these companies as "costs" were presented to the Paper Control Tribunal yesterday afternoon by W.N. Tilley, counsel for Canadian publishers. It was shown that one company alone, the Abitibi, wrote up its timber limits and water powers, which it got for nothing, as being worth \$6,000,000. Moreover, this same company includes in the "costs," of newspaper, which it asks publishers to pay, the sum of \$2 per copy for stumpage that costs only 45 cents per cord. Thus it capitalizes at from \$12,400,000 to \$15,500,000, woodlands that do not represent one dollar of actual investment. This information was brought out during the hearing of the appeal from the decision of Paper Control Tribunal, which fixed the minimum price of newspaper at 60c, retroactive to July 1, 1918. The hearing will likely run over into next week, as Mr. Tilley, for the publishers, spoke all day Wednesday without half finishing his brief.

### Dominion Revenue Big

UP TO \$32,000,000 IN 9 MONTHS.

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—The present fiscal year will show heavy Dominion revenue. For the nine months period ending Dec. 31, according to Finance Department returns, current revenues totalled \$22,485,552, an increase of nearly \$32,000,000 over the same period of the year previous. For the month of December alone, the revenue was \$2,552,723, as against \$2,285,552, in the corresponding month of 1917. In spite of prohibition, both excise and customs revenues have increased. Expenditure on consolidated fund account was last month \$16,547,263, as compared with \$17,361,674 in December, 1917. For the whole nine months period, however, expenditure on the same account was \$14,632,537 for the nine months ending December 31, 1917. The net debt was increased by \$22,799,237 during December. It now stands at \$1,320,228,898.

### Bag Potatoes 90 Lbs.

SELLERS UNINTENTIONALLY BROKE BYLAW OF THE MARKET.

London, Ont.—Frederick Branton, farmer, and Robert Uptgrove, dealer, each fined \$10 and costs in police court for having bags of potatoes on the market for sale that did not contain the 90 pounds required by law.

Inspector J.W. McCallum, who seized the potatoes on December 28, stated that two of Branton's bags of spuds were 9 and 10 pounds short, while Uptgrove's were under weight by 8 and 10 pounds. Both men declared that they had not weighed the murrills. He had measured them out in half bushels and had rounded up the measures. They had had no idea of selling any produce short of 90 pounds.

"It seems to me that in these times, when people are paying the highest prices for farm products, they are at the farmers can do is to give true weight," stated Magistrate Bartlett, after hearing the evidence. "I could fine you \$50 each. Several fines have recently been paid into this court for the same offence, and apparently it has done no good. I am going to increase the penalty to \$10 in the hope that this sort of thing will stop. The fines were paid."

### The Sinn Fein Program

TO CHOOSE OWN FORM OF GOVERNMENT AFTER INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION.

London, Jan. 9.—The first publication of what purports to be a Sinn Fein constitution for Ireland was made today. This has a particular interest in view of the Sinn Fein proposal to hold an Irish congress in the near future. The preamble of the constitution runs as follows:

"Whereas, the people of Ireland never had relinquished their claim to separate nationhood, and, whereas, the provisional government of the Irish republic at Easter, 1916, in the name of the Irish people and continuing the fight made by previous generations reasserted the inalienable right of the Irish nation to sovereign independence and reaffirmed the determination of the Irish people to achieve it and, International Recognition."

"Whereas, the proclamation of an Irish republic at Easter, 1916, and the supreme courage and the glorious sacrifices of the men who gave their lives to maintain it have united the people of Ireland under the flag of the Irish republic, we, the delegated representatives of the Irish people in congress assembled, declare the following to be the constitution of the Sinn Fein."

The article then sets forth the Sinn Fein aims at securing international recognition of Ireland as an independent republic, and having achieved that status that Irish people by a referendum may freely choose their own form of government. It says that the Sinn Fein organization shall "in the name of the sovereign Irish people deny the right and oppose the will of the British Parliament and the British Crown or any foreign government to legislate for Ireland."

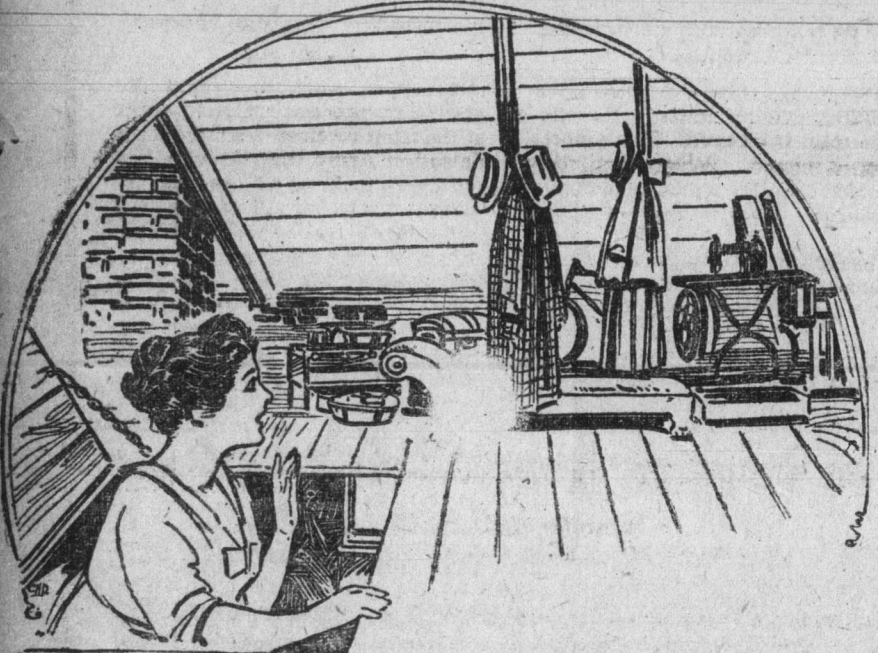

### O.M.A. Executive Meets

INCREASE IN THE STATUTE LABOR TAX ON ALIENS RECOMMENDED.

The executive of the Ontario Municipal Association had a number of legislative proposals before Hon. W.D. McPherson, the Provincial Secretary, yesterday. The measures asked for cover a variety of matters including authority to expropriate public utilities within the municipality, authority to provide for an optional system of municipal government, the fixing of four feet as the standard width of sleighs with runners two inches wide, the endorsement of specified fire prevention appliances, power to compel telephone companies to pay for the use of the streets, and an increase in the statute labor tax on aliens to \$25. A request was also made for the standardization of danger signals on roadways.

The municipal representatives present included: G.K. Dewey of Brookville, S.H. Baker of London, E.M. Young of Picton, Miss Mary Grant of London Township, I.F. Vance of Hamilton, W.B. Doherty of St. Thomas, Martin Buchner of Kitchener, H.P. Leonard, of Brantford, S. Watt of St. Catharines, T.H. Manley of Sarnia, M.B. Holmes of Athens, A.K. Bunnell of Brantford, S.H. Kent of Hamilton, City Solicitor Waddell of Hamilton.

The Minister promised to bring the matters before the Cabinet.
