

Poultry as a Business For Returned Soldiers

"Bred-to-lay" Barred Rocks won the Egg-laying Contest at Guelph Winter Fair with a score of 42 points.

J.R. Stork, St. Catharines, Ont. Poultry-raising and egg-production as a business for the returned soldier was discussed at the recent Poultry Conference at Ottawa when W.J. Black, Chairman of the Land Settlement Board told the gathering that the Board wanted to assist soldiers to take up poultry work, particularly partially disabled men, and asked that the conference appoint a committee of poultry men to act in an advisory capacity.

"If a man is experienced in poultry raising and wants to take it up, he will be assisted by the Settlement Board." Said Commissioner Black. "Land will be urnished and financial assistance advanced. But we are not advancing money unless it can be shown that poultry will be the most profitable line of farm work the applicant can take up.
