According to A History of Peel County, which was on display at the Library when Duquette announced McLaughlin's plans, Cherry Hill was built by Joseph Silverthorn, his third residence on land granted to

him in 1807. He was only 20 when he began farming in Peel, and brought high bride from Lundy's Lane into "a howling wilderness, literally NEXT WEEK- EDDIE DANNELY howling, with wolves who stole from young Joseph's little stock of first livestock."

Jack Eisenberg is coauthor of a book entitled Don't Teach That, which details cases from all across Canada where teachers have stepped out of line and into controversy.

The book poses the question: "Who has the right to teach matters of personal belief? Goverments infor troduce programs teaching sex, religion politics and morals in the schools. Parents protest, claiming it is their responsibility within the family."
