"Marines" tied the defeat tag on "Spike" Pryke's Reliance to win in a Merriwell finish 4 to 3 and cause a three-way tangle for first place in group "A", with the No. 5 I. T. S. "Flyers" enjoying a slot along with the victorious Marines and the previous-to league leading Reliance.

Whats-to-do about the whole situation now lies in the hands of the league executive, which meets tonight to try and fathom out the most tangled problem yet to face a softball executive in Belleville. The league big-wigs today find Reliance, "Marines" and "Flyers" all tied for first place in group "A", while in the junior loop the Army and Navy Juniors are bunched on top of the final schedule standing with Foundries and regardless as to how you look at matters and from whatever angle, play-offs galore are in the making.

In the curtain-raiser the Foundry lads scored a single run in the first and added a trio more in the fifth when they shelled Grant Wright from the juniors' hilltop and cinched the piece. A walk, an error and a couple of singles gave Red Townsend's kids their entire three runs in the sixth as Freddie Waite fired six-hit ball off the Foundry mound. Murney Green's mammoth circuit blow in the sixth seemed to give Reliance enough, but alas. Trailing 3 to 1 the Marines rallied in the last frame after Anderson walked Cousineau and Peoples. Partridge drove a hard grounder to LaBonne, who elected for the forceout at third and threw into the dirt for an error and two runs scored, including the tying counter. Partridge raced around to third and scored on Bud Shannon's line drive over short to win the piece. Shannon previously covered himself with glory with a fine running catch of LaBonne's drive into centre, therefore making Bud Shannon pretty much of a hero.

A nearby Cobourg lad, recently inducted into the R. C. A. F., won the summer track and field meet championship at No. 5 Initial Training School here yesterday when LAC. Wilford Titford romped home to the individual athletic meet title. Titford garnered 13 points by virtue of winning the javelin throw, the high jump and finishing second in the discus toss. Tied for second with individual points were Paul Picard of Toronto and Leroy Pietz of Crystal Beach with eight points each.

Under ideal weather conditions the meet saw the entire personnel of No. 5 I. T. S. present, while Wing Commander A. J. Snetsinger, officer commanding the unit, personally congratulated the youthful track and field champions and presented medals and ribbons to the respective individual and group champions of the station.
